

Meetings Attract Faculty Members

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 15, at the First United Methodist Church for Dr. Frank Slobetz, psychology department chairman, who died at 2 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 12, in St. Cloud Hospital. He had been hospitalized since early October, when he suffered a heart attack. Benson Funeral Home is handling the funeral arrangements. Visitation will be after 2 p.m. Friday. Instead of flowers the family prefers memorials either to the college or to the First United Methodist Church. Dr. Slobetz joined the faculty in 1949. He served as chairman of the division of education, philosophy and psychology and, since 1962, as psychology department chairman.

Faculty response to a questionnaire from the President's Commission shows strong support for the establishment of a College Senate composed of students, faculty and administrators. The questionnaire was distributed to all faculty members. Of the 276 returned:

* The attitude scale shows that 87 strongly agree with the establishment of a College Senate, while 130 agree, 12 have no opinion, 24 disagree and 18 strongly disagree.

* Regarding the total size of the group, 118 favor fewer than 50 members, 82 want between 50 and 75 members, 26 favor 75 to 100 members and two want more than 100.

* Opinions vary on the ratio of faculty to administrators to students, but most favor a small group: 30 want a 1-1-1 ratio; 29 favor a 2-1-2 split; 22 said 2-1-1; 20 favor a 3-1-2 division and 19 want a 3-2-1 split.

* A majority favor an elected senate according to subgroups, but lack agreement on

which subgroups should be represented.

Within the next few weeks the President's Commission will hold hearings for anyone wishing to speak on the proposal. The dates will be announced in the Chronicle. After the hearings the Commission will draw up a recommendation either favoring or rejecting the idea of a College Senate and forward it to President Wick, who will decide whether to send it to the Faculty and Student Senates.

The Speech Science, Pathology and Audiology staff--Dr. Martin Kammermeier, Dr. Joan Jacobson, Robert Duffy and Eleanor Patton--are attending a national American Speech and Hearing Association convention in Chicago. Dr. Kammermeier will conduct a meeting on esophageal speech during the Nov. 11-15 sessions. A paper entitled "Phonemic Discrimination Abilities of /4/ Defective and Normal Speaking Children" will be read by Dave Peterson, a 1969 M.A. recipient from St. Cloud. Six graduate students and 21 undergraduates also are attending the convention.

Two Retirements Bring End

To 57 Years of Service

Ruth Gehm To Retire Dec. 30—Faculty and staff members have been invited to a reception next Monday, Dec. 15, in honor of a retiring veteran of 37 years at St. Cloud State College. The get-together, from 2 - 3:30 p.m. in the Herbert Room of Atwood Memorial College Center, is for Ruth Gehm, who will retire Dec. 30. Between 60 and 65 staff members gathered at a luncheon for Ruth Dec. 10 and presented her with a \$50 savings bond. Monday President Robert H. Wick will present Ruth with a certificate of merit, signed by Governor Harold Levander, recognizing her years of service to the state.

Ruth joined the college staff in 1931 as the civil service staff of the library. "There were only four librarians: then," she recalled, "and as the secretary I worked on catalog cards, did clerical work and prepared stencils for the library science classes." There were 400 students at St. Cloud then.

Since 1946 Ruth has worked in the Admissions Office. But the specialization that exists today, keeping five full-time civil service people busy, wasn't so common 23 years ago. Students registered in the auditorium of Old Main and Ruth did not only recording, but also typing, mimeographing, post office work and—in her spare time—relief work at the switchboard. Ruth feels that specialization within the college has brought more efficiency. But, she added, "we did things differently because we had to."

Ed Heying Concluding 20 Years at St. Cloud State—Ed Heying, a building grounds foreman who will retire Jan. 2 after 20 years at St. Cloud, will be the guest at a reception Wed., Jan. 7, in the Civic-Penney Room of Atwood Memorial College Center. Faculty, staff and other St. Cloud people are expected during the gathering from 2 to 4 p.m.

Ed is well-known both on and off the campus, due in part to a job that keeps him continually on the move and seldom in his office in the Maintenance Building.

When he came to St. Cloud there were about 820 students here, he recalled. "There was a saw, a hammer and a miter square," Ed said, "and they had to buy me a hammer when I started." He did general repair work then and carried his tools with him from building to building. The crew then was small, but did painting, plumbing, carpenter work and pall utilities maintenance.

With the growth of the college came added responsibilities and in 1961 Ed became a foreman. "I inherited two pickups, three '56 Chevy stations wagons and one tractor," he said. Today there are 48 different units ranging from trucks to a rotary snow plow and three highway plows. Specialization has come too—there are two groundsmen, two painters, two carpenters and a mason today—and Ed supervises about 100 of the custodial staff and janitors besides 28 Maintenance Building personnel other than mechanical or electrical workers.

"I'll miss the people and the challenge of the job," Ed said. "The faculty and the administration have gone a long, long way to help us, and there are just too many people to mention by name." Ed, who ran his own plumbing and heating store for 17 years before joining the college staff, doesn't plan an idle retirement. He's had several offers of part-time jobs, but insists that he "doesn't want to be obligated." Instead he wants to do some travelling and be obligated this winter only to do some ice fishing.

Retirement Deductions About to Begin--Maurie Smith, business office, reminds faculty members that those eligible for the supplemental retirement plan may be due for a payroll deduction. Faculty members are eligible if tenured or in their third year at a state college; administrators who are not teaching are eligible their first year at a state college. Five per cent of their cumulative fiscal year earnings between \$6,000 and \$15,000 will be deducted. Upon certification, participation is mandatory by state law, Smith said, although maximum deduction in a fiscal year is \$450.

Building Commission To Visit Campus—The Legislative Building Commission will be on campus Tuesday (Feb.10). Building, maintenance and land acquisition needs for the 1971—72 biennium will be presented from 8 to 10 a.m.in the Civic—Penney Room of Atwood Center. The Board passed a resolution at last Monday's meeting (May 11) commending the students, faculties and administrators of the six state colleges "for the spirit and the manner in which they responded to the events of national concern during the week of May 4, 1970.

"By keeping the State Colleges open for strikers and non-strikers alike, by encouraging the expression of minority and majority opinions, and by insisting on respect for the law and for personal property rights, the members of the State College communities have honored the traditions of independence and fairness which are an integral part of political and educational life in Minnesota."

Massmann and Tideman will replace Dr. Ruben Parson and Dr. Clavin Gower, respectively, who plan to return to full-time teaching. 

(NOTE: At Commencement last Spring President Wick spoke briefly to graduates about the relationship between freedom and discipline. He repeated some of those remarks in a convocation address to new students September 23 in Halenbeck Hall. At the request of several faculty members, this issue of Faculty News is devoted to excerpts from that address.)

Freedom and Discipline

Great events have transpired during your lifetime and important issues have occupied your attention. One of the most important themes of concern to all people in this era has been that of freedom.

On the international scene, we have witnessed the continuation of the struggle for national liberty and the emergence of new nations. Within our own nation and state, there have been various movements seeking freedom from prejudice, freedom from poverty, freedom from war, and freedom from oppression. Within the community of the college, students have concerned themselves with their own freedom.

Freedom, as a value or goal, never stands alone. It must always be balanced with responsibility or, to use a term that is not very popular today, with discipline. We delude ourselves when we advocate, discuss, or seek freedom as an absolute. As long as we live in a human society, it must be sought within the balancing concept of discipline. Freedom without discipline results only in chaos, disorder, and anarchy. From history there is a clear proclamation that the one thing human beings cannot endure is chaos.... A society cannot exist without discipline, nor can an individual.

With all the vigor at my command, I must speak out against those who have condoned violence in the name of liberal goals, because I know that they and their causes will be the first casualties if the violent trend were to continue to its ultimate end. I have tried to convince those I could reach of something that I think we all should try to remember: that there can be no true civilization without liberty, there can be no liberty without order, and there can be no order without justice.

If you will remember only one thing that I have to say today, I hope that it will be this. Human history teaches us that men will be disciplined from within or they will be disciplined from without. To speak of freedom only and forget the necessity of discipline is to forget the recorded experience of mankind.

All too much of our agitation and discussion today centers on freedom from something. Too little attention is given to the more important aspect of freedom for something.

It is my sincere hope that as you pursue your college career you will seek and covet freedom for the creative use of your highest and best talents, for the constructive service of your fellow man and for the fulfillment of God's purpose in your life.

Dr. Hannah replaces Dr. Alfred Lease, vice-president for administrative affairs, who resigned from the committee after his name was submitted as a nominee for the presidency. The presidential search procedure adopted by the board specifies that a committee member who becomes a candidate for the presidency automatically loses membership and must be replaced.

State College Board Meets—At its May 10 meeting in St. Paul the State College Board took the following action: (1) Approved a request by Chancellor Nitau and the six college presidents to establish a Commission on the Status of Women in the State College System. I am confident that Dr. McDonald will meet the challenge of this new assignment with vision and vigor. I look forward to working with him." McDonald joined the Mankato faculty in 1967 after completing a Ph.D. degree in higher education administration at Michigan State University. Enrollment Tops 4,000 Mark--For the first time, summer enrollment has topped the 4,000 mark, according to preliminary figures from Paul Ingwell, institutional research. The total for first summer session students is 4,219. This is up 288 students, or 6.8 per cent, over the first session last summer. Those enrolled include 2,725 undergraduates, 1,273 graduate students and 221 special students. Undergraduate enrollment is up 6.7 per cent and graduate enrollment is up 10.5 per cent over the same period one year ago.

Administrators' Conference Begins--Dr. Harlan Shores, education professor at the University of Illinois, opened the fourth annual Administrators' Mid-Summer Conference at 9:15 a.m. Monday (July 19) with a speech on "Future Challenges in Instruction." Speeches and follow-up discussions are planned in such areas as human relations, drug and environmental education and the year-round school. The conference continues through Tuesday (July 20). Petition Procedure Adopted--The State College Board has adopted an interim procedure to handle petitions and appeals by non-tenured faculty people whose employment has been terminated effective this spring. The interim policy does not apply to non-tenured people who were given notice this spring that their contracts will not be renewed one year hence. For those in the latter category a permanent procedure will be adopted and announced this fall. Information regarding the interim procedure may be obtained from the President's Office or any of the vice presidents and academic deans.

Enrollment Drops Second Session -- Total enrollment has dipped to 3,137 for the second summer session after a record 4,254 first-session students. Total enrollment for both sessions, though, still exceeds by 150 overall enrollment during the summer of 1970. According to preliminary figures from Paul Ingwell, institutional research, the 1971 second session total is 173 less than the 1970 total, a drop of 5.2 percent. This session's enrollment includes 2,113 undergraduates, 827 graduate students and 197 special students. These are drops of 71, 49 and 53, respectively, over last year's comparable figures.

Ann Stai Funeral Tuesday -- Former St. Cloud State employee Ann Stai died Saturday (Aug. 7), one week after an accident near Sauk Rapids killed three companions in the car with her. Mrs. Stai, who was hired as director of Shoemaker Hall in 1946, never regained consciousness. She was 82. The funeral will be at 2 p.m. Tuesday (Aug. 10) at the First United Methodist Church.
