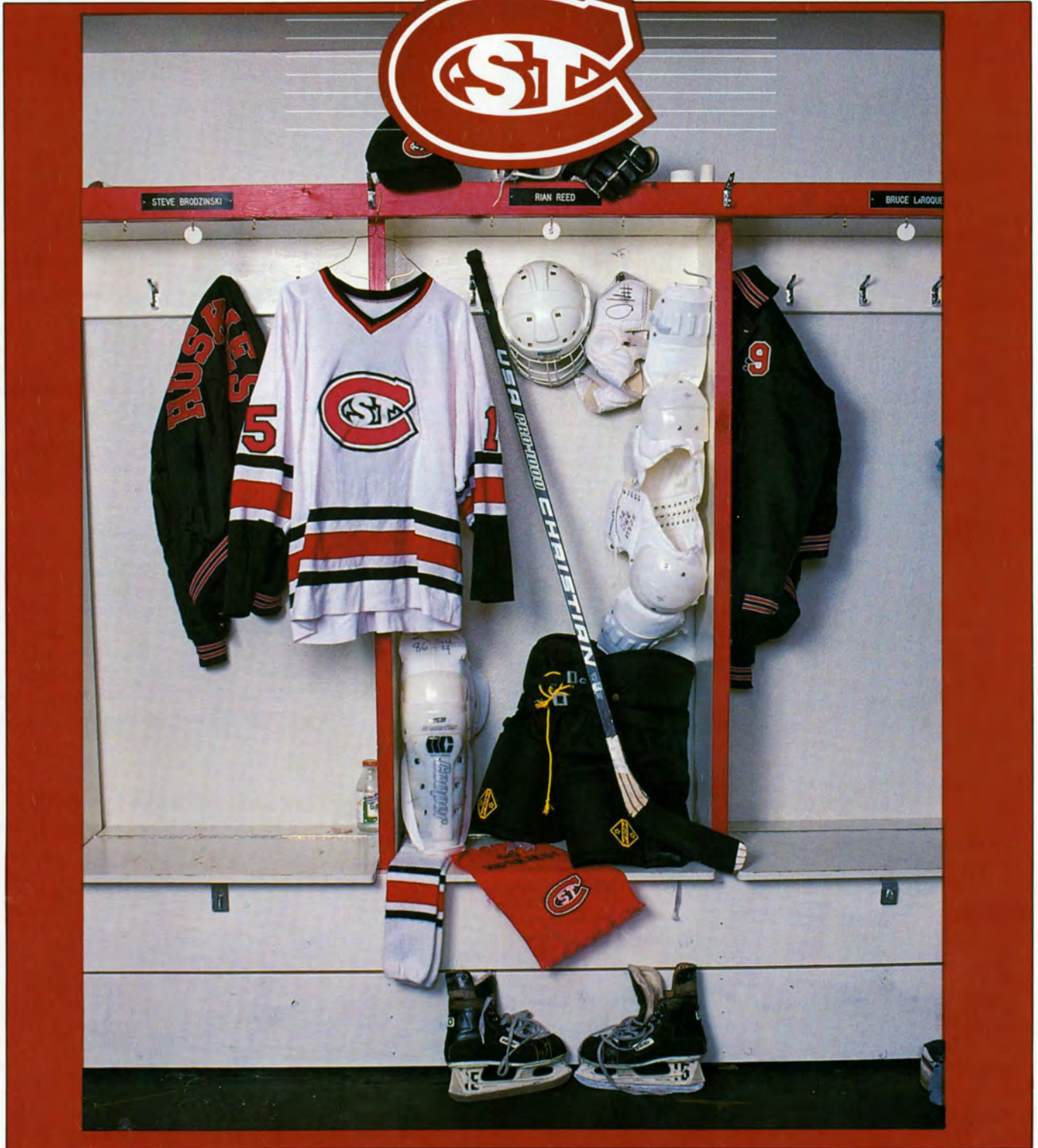

Head Coach Herb Brooks

In a 1986, newspaper article, Herb Brooks was described as a "Man With a Mission." "The Mission," as it was referred to is to develop the St. Cloud State University hockey program into a competitive NCAA Division I program. The man to do it is Herb Brooks, a name that is synonymous with hockey success at any level.

Brooks started his coaching career as Glen Sonmor's assistant with the University of Minnesota Gophers and after coaching a St. Paul junior hockey team became the Gopher head coach in 1972. Brooks spent seven seasons with the Gophers winning NCAA I national titles in 1974, 1976 and 1979. In 1975, the Gophers won the WCHA title and were national champion runner-ups. In his seven-year stint at Minnesota, Brooks compiled a 175-100-20 overall won/lost/tie record, three Division I National Championships and a WCHA title.

In 1979, Brooks headed the United States National Hockey Team and in 1980 became the head coach of the U.S. Olympic Team. It was the 1980 Olympic Team that captured the hearts of America when they upset the Soviet Union, 4-3, in a game often referred to as the "Miracle on Ice." The U.S. went on to win the Olympic Gold in Lake Placid.

Brooks coached in Davos, Switzerland during the 1980-81 season and returned to the U.S. in 1981 to become the head coach of the New York Rangers. With the Rangers, Brooks led his teams to two division finals and gained 100 victories faster than any coach in the club's history.

In the winter of 1986, Brooks coached Team Minnesota, a group of Minnesota High School All-Stars to the National Junior Olympic Tournament title.

In May of 1986, Herb Brooks signed on as the 15th head coach in the history of the St. Cloud State University hockey program. Brooks inherits a Northern Collegiate Hockey Association (NCHA) NCAA Division III hockey program and in a plan that covers a four-year span, he will elevate the SCSU program into a competitive Division I league. The plan is to continue at the Division III level for the 1986-87 season and then become an Independent during the 1987-88 and 1988-89 seasons with the intent of joining a Division I conference the following year.

Brooks' many coaching honors bring to light the success he has experienced over the years. Among his honors are *Sports Illustrated* Sportsman of the Year, Associated Press Outstanding Male Athlete of the Year, National Sportswriters and Sportscasters Headliner of the Year Award, Pro Comfort's Great Feats Award, ABC Sports Athlete of the Year and the Dunlop Pro-Am Award.

A native of St. Paul, Minnesota, Brooks played hockey at Johnson High School. He then attended the University of

Minnesota where he played under coach John Mariucci and was a three-year letterwinner. Brooks played on the 1964 and 1968 U.S. Hockey Teams and co-captained the 1968 squad. He played on five U.S. National Hockey Teams and captained three of the teams.

Herb Brooks as a player and a coach has participated in Olympic and World Championships more than any other American. Brooks has made nine appearances, seven as a player and two as a coach, in an Olympic or World ice hockey Championship.

Brooks and his wife Patti, have a son, Dan and a daughter, Kelly.

Craig Dahl joins the SCSU athletic program as an assistant hockey coach. His responsibilities include scheduling, coordinating recruiting, and on-ice instruction.

Dahl is very familiar with hockey in the Midwest. During the 1985-86 hockey season, Dahl led the University of Wisconsin-River Falls to a 16-12-3 record. Prior to joining the Falcon program, Dahl was the head coach at Bethel College for five years. While coaching at Bethel, Dahl was named the 1984-85 MIAC Coach of the Year and the College Division Coach of the Year in the West.

A native of Albert Lea, Minnesota, Dahl attended the University of Minnesota on a football scholarship in the fall of 1971. He transferred to Pacific Lutheran University in Washington and graduated in 1976. At Albert Lea High School, Dahl was an all-conference defenseman in hockey and an all-state quarterback in football.

STUDENT ASSISTANT COACHES

Two familiar names to SCSU hockey have joined the Husky coaching staff as student assistants during the 1986-87 season. Former SCSU players Bob Motzko and Bill Ries will take on new roles with the Huskies. Motzko was a two-year letter winner for the Huskies and is from Austin, Minnesota. Ries was an alternate captain last season and was a four-year SCSU letterwinner from Detroit Lakes, Minnesota.

Media Information

Working Press—Media credentials for covering SCSU hockey must be made in advance through the Sports Information Office. Names of working press will be put on a list and posted at the entrance to the rink. Credentials should be picked up in the press box. All photographers will be instructed as to where they can shoot from.

Videotape—Two platforms have been installed for videotaping. One platform is reserved for SCSU and the other for the visiting team. There is limited space in the press box which can handle 1 to 2 cameras.

Radio—All radio lines must be set up by each station. Stations can set up these lines by calling Northwestern Bell at 612-344-2100.

Post Game Interview—At the conclusion of each game, Coach Brooks will meet with the press after a ten minute cooling off period. Also following the cooling off period, members of the SCSU team will be available to the media. The SCSU Sports Information staff will be available to help you locate the players or coaches.

The Outlook

Exit: One collegiate hockey coach who lifted St. Cloud State University from Northern Collegiate Hockey Association (NCHA) mediocrity to national poll notoriety. **Enter:** One man who orchestrated the Miracle on Ice by coaching Team USA to a gold medal at the 1980 Winter Olympic Games.

John Perpich, who coached St. Cloud State to a collective record of 30-24-4 in two seasons, accepted the head coaching position at Ferris State College last spring. While at SCSU, Perpich combined a strong defense with experienced forwards as the Huskies captured second and fifth place in 1985 and 1986, respectively. Last winter the Huskies led the NCHA on six different occasions before darkhorse Mankato State University and perennial power Bemidji State University seized command.

The coaching vacancy allowed the appointment of Herb Brooks who coached the University of Minnesota Gophers to three NCAA Division I titles in seven years. Following the Olympic gold in 1980, Brooks stylized his European hockey philosophy in Davos, Switzerland with a one-year coaching stint. Returning to the United States, Brooks garnered 1982 National Hockey League Coach of the Year honors as head coach of the New York Rangers.

Assisting Brooks will be Craig Dahl, former University of Wisconsin-River Falls head hockey coach. In his only season at River Falls, Dahl compiled a 16-12-3 mark for a fourth-place NCHA finish. Dahl, 1984-85 Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) Coach of the Year, earned College Division Coach of the Year in the West honors the same season as Bethel head coach.

With a change in coaching personnel comes a long-range plan that will develop St. Cloud State into a Division I school. However, the Huskies must face a competitive 1986-87 NCHA schedule; and they do so with 21 returning players.

POSITION BREAKDOWNS:

Goalkeepers: "Our question mark this season is goaltending," Dahl said. "We need consistency game-in and game-out. The team needs an attitude such as a good work ethic and a strong desire to be the best they can be."

Returning to the Huskies' nets will be starting goalkeeper Bill Korfhage (Jr., West St. Paul). Voted team Rookie of the Year two seasons ago, Korfhage registered a 4.11 goals-against average, recorded one shutout and compiled an 11-9-2 overall record last winter. Korfhage set a St. Cloud State record for most goalkeeper appearances (26) in one season.

Challenging Korfhage will be recruits Jim Dick (Fr., Manitoba, CAN), and John Morioka (Fr., Roseville). Dick recorded the lowest goals-against average of the Manitoba Junior Hockey League (MJHL) last season and participated in the MJHL all-star game. Morioka, Alexander-Ramsey hockey and golf Most Valuable Player, was nominated to the All-North Suburban Conference squad last year.

Defensemen: The Huskies' defensive corps retains four lettermen and welcomes three highly-touted recruits. Leading the way will be tri-captain John Matchinsky (Sr., St. Cloud), a first-team all-conference pick last spring. Matchinsky tallied 10 goals and added 18 assists while leading the team in blocked shots (36) and plus/minus average (+21). Matchinsky earned all-conference academic honors two seasons ago, and ranks 23rd among SCSU all-time scorers with 71 points.

Joining Matchinsky on the blueline are Tim St. Martin (Jr., St. Paul)—St. Cloud State's leading penalty getter (35-70)—, Jerry Schmidt (So., Roseville) and D.J. Haller (So., Columbia Heights). Schmidt and Haller combined for 15 points and 33 blocked shots last season as a pair of the Huskies' defensive-minded defensemen.

Brooks' recruiting prospects include Shorty Forrest (Fr., Blaine), Mike Hastings (Fr., Crookston) and Tony Schmalzbauer (Fr., St. Paul). Forrest received All-North Suburban Conference honors in hockey and baseball, and Hastings skated in the Maroon-Gold All-Star Game and won Crookston Central High School's best defenseman award three consecutive years. Schmalzbauer was drafted on the sixth round of the 1986 NHL entry draft by the New York Islanders.



Forwards: St. Cloud State returns a host of quality forwards. 1986-87 tri-captain Mike Brodzinski (Sr., Blaine) amassed 47 points (18 goals, 29 assists), eight power-play tallies and a points-per game average of 1.68 as team scoring leader last season. An all-conference honorable mention choice, Brodzinski led the Huskies in NCHA scoring (22 points) and points-per game average (1.29).

Providing firepower on the Huskies' offense will be Steve Brodzinski (Jr., Blaine), 1985-86 team Most Valuable Player. Brodzinski accumulated 36 points on 21 goals and 15 assists while leading the SCSU contingent in short-handed (2) and game-winning goals (5).

Another forward Brooks and Dahl will be counting on for scoring production is Todd Holt (Jr., Brooklyn Park), leading scorer two seasons ago. Holt, a 1985 all-conference honorable mention nomination, scored 14 goals and added 17 assists last year. Even though a late-season injury thwarted his playing time, Holt remains 23rd on the all-time SCSU scoring list with 71 points. Tri-captain Rian Reed (Sr., Grand Rapids) and Steve Witucki (So., New Brighton) combined for 86 points last season and are being counted on to make contributions to the Huskies' offense this winter.

Dahl cites five recruits expected to create competition for starting spots: Mark Alexander (Fr., St. Paul), Scott Chartier (Fr., Cloquet), Ryan Christian (Fr., Warroad), Herm Finnegan (Fr., Burnsville) and Tray Tuomie (Fr., St. Paul), two-year St. Paul City Conference scoring leader.

NCHA: Certainly the Cinderella of last year's NCHA season, Mankato State will attempt to weave another fairy tale despite the loss of graduating forwards Troy Jutting and Jon Hill. Jutting, an all-conference selection, totaled 25 points last season while Hill, an all-NCHA honorable mention choice, scored 23 points. Head Coach Don Brose is not crying yet, however. He sports the NCHA's best goalkeeper in Ken Hilgert, who allowed 49 goals for a 3.06 goals-against average.

Regular season and playoff titlist Bemidji State University faces stiff competition minus its all-time scoring leader. Mike Alexander ended his collegiate career as the Beavers' all-time leading scorer (252 points) and is the only player in NCHA history named conference Most Valuable Player twice. Alexander highlighted the all-NCHA team, joined by teammates Greg Biskup, Tim Lescarbeau and Todd Lescarbeau. Bemidji State Head Coach Bob Peters received NCHA Coach of the Year honors after guiding the Beavers to the NCAA Division II championship last spring. Peters has won the award four times in the five-year NCHA history.

In contention for the middle third tier will be University of Wisconsin-River Falls, St. Scholastica and conference newcomer University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. River Falls returns defensemen Brent Nagel and Tom Niles. St. Scholastica loses goalkeeper Cory Goddard and defenseman Jay Borman, both named to the 1985-86 all-NCHA Squad. Also gone is Eric Oakman, the third leading scorer in conference play last season with 35 points.

Rounding out the NCHA will be University of Wisconsin-Superior and University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, under new head coach Mike Eaves, former NHL player/coach.

Dahl said the Huskies can fare favorably against any team in the conference, relying mainly on the 21 veterans.

Dahl's expectations for the 1986-87 season include a sold-out arena, increased fan support and a new, exciting team. "We (Brooks and Dahl) want the players to not only learn about hockey, but about being decent human beings," Dahl said.
