THE EDUCATION BUILDING

Seven years have elapsed since the request for a School of Education Building reached the top of the priority list for construction on the St. Cloud State College campus.

The request to the Legislative Building Commission, the appropriation of planning money, initial planning, appropriation of construction money, intensive planning with the architect, construction and moving have been steps along the way.

Hopes realized, frustrations overcome or lived with, adjustment to the space age pace of changing needs and demands — these have been a part of those seven years until now.

The design and construction of a building always has a philosophical base. The School of Education building was designed to serve people and programs that are people oriented.

Seven years ago we were asking: What kind of building would provide an environment where all who used it would be stimulated to learn, to try different ideas and to work together comfortably? Now we are asking: How can we utilize this building to foster good human relationships and develop approaches to learning and teaching to meet human needs of which we are not yet aware?

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
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
