ADDITION WILL DOUBLE SIZE OF COLLEGE HEATING PLANT

An addition which will double the size of the college heating plant is now under construction. The structure will adjoin the south side of the existing building.

A network of steam tunnels installed on the campus last fall will be part of the new heating system, according to Howard Walton, director of physical resources.

St. Cloud State College will offer 22 evening courses this spring in eight central Minnesota communities. Classes will be conducted on Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning March 23.

CONSTRUCTION STARTS APRIL 15 ON ALEXANDRIA SUMMER THEATRE

Construction will begin April 15 on a summer theatre near Alexandria in which ten comedies and dramas will be presented during the 1961 tourist season. The model 300-seat theatre will be built on the Park Lane Country Club property at Lake L'homme Dieu.

Operating the theatre will be a newly organized non-profit corporation called the Alexandria-St. Cloud State College Performing Arts Foundation. President George Budd heads the board of directors.

Professional actors will make up the resident company supported by outstanding college drama students from the Upper Midwest. Dr. Arthur Housman and Keith Michael will supervise the program.

Season tickets soon will be available. Each production will run one week, Tuesday through Saturday.

NEW CURRICULUM ADDED IN MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY

A new curriculum in medical technology leading to a bachelor's degree is in effect at St. Cloud State College with the approval of the State College Board.

Under the program, students will receive twelve months of instruction at the School of Medical Technology at St. Cloud Hospital after completing three academic years at the college.

DR. APPLEGATE TO COORDINATE TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAM

Dr. Irvamae Applegate, professor of education, has been named associate dean for teacher education at St. Cloud State College, effective July 1.

Dr. Applegate will coordinate the teacher education program, which is a part of all academic divisions. She also will head the Division of Education, which will include members of the Campus Laboratory School staff and off-campus student teaching supervisors.

Dr. Frank Slobetz, professor of education and psychology, was named chairman of the Division of Psychology. The education and psychology divisions will replace the present Division of Education, Philosophy and Psychology headed by Dr. Slobetz. In the Division of Education, Dr. Perry will be director of student teaching, a new position.

In setting up the Division of Psychology, President George F. Budd pointed out that psychology is a separate academic discipline and is no longer limited to educational psychology in the college curriculum. The Psychological Services Center will continue to operate under the direction of Dr. Victor Lohmann.

President Budd also appointed Dr. James Harris, professor of history, chairman of the Division of Social Sciences. He replaces Dr. H. P. Lohrmann, who asked to be relieved of the administrative assignment.

Another administrative change will become effective this summer with the replacement of Dr. H. A. Clugston as academic dean by Dr. Charles Balcer.

Clugston Comments:

ACADEMIC DEAN, COMPLETING 30 YEARS AT THE COLLEGE, REFLECTS ON GROWTH AND CHANGES HE HAS WITNESSED

(Editor*s Note: This spring marks the completion of 30 years of service on the St. Cloud State College faculty for Academic Dean Herbert A. Clugston. Although he soon will step down as dean, Dr. Clugston will continue to teach until his retirement in 1963. On the occasion of his 30th "anniversary", Dean Clugston was asked to reflect at random on those eventful years between 1931 and 1961, and to comment on the present situation as he sees it. The following paragraphs summarize those observations.)

GROWTH

From the vantage point of 30 years at the college, the last $17\frac{1}{2}$ as academic dean, one gains perspective with respect to the growth that has taken place. Growth brings with it both the good and the not so good. Predominantly, it has brought good to this college. The student body has grown to proportions unpredictable in 1931. The total enrollment for the fall quarter of 1931 was 1,001. Full-time, on-campus enrollment last fall was 3,096.

The curriculum has undergone many changes. A major curriculum revision in 1934 under the leadership of Dr. John Mc-Crary witnessed the struggle between those who desired a more liberal education and those who wanted to retain the emphasis on methods. The "general constants" were established at this time, anticipating by 16 years the arrival of the "general education" program. The majors and minors included these general constants, the special methods courses and student teaching. A second major curriculum revision in 1950 corrected this situation by eliminating these and creating more substantial majorminor areas. The influx of men students after World War II created a demand for a more diversified curriculum. No longer was the college to be a single purpose institution for educating teachers. First came the pre-professional curriculums and joint registration with the University of Minnesota. Then came the demand for the bachelor of arts degree curriculum. Finally, in response to mounting requests, came the graduate program with its master of science in education degree. All of these created demands for new courses, new emphases and new staff. In 1960, a Curriculum Survey Committee was created to study intensively the curriculum and instructional organization of the college. Findings and recommendations of this committee are even now being implemented. Ever mindful of its fine reputation, the college seeks further refinement and development of its program and studies.

SPECIAL SERVICES

The college has developed areas for preparation of teachers in special education, such as speech correction, mental retardation, cerebral palsy, reading and counseling, sponsored a program making school psychologists available to area schools unable to afford these services by themselves. The Psychological Services Center has enjoyed phenominal success. Begun in 1948 for the purpose of developing a program of counseling and remedial reading, it has become recognized as one of the outstanding centers of its kind in the Upper Midwest. The organization and development of the Bureau of Instructional Resources has made more functional the excellent library, the audio-visual center and the curriculum laboratory.

One of the outstanding accomplishments has been the development of the off-campus student teaching program. Now operating in 26 cooperating public schools, it is providing students with the opportunity to live the life of a teacher and to learn the art of teaching under the supervision of well-prepared col- STUDENT TEACHING lege supervisors and competent participating classroom teachers. Cooperating schools are now, in fact, a part of the college program for the education of teachers.

one big happy family." By and large that was true. We of the faculty knew each other and each other's families. There were no divisions, departments, chairmen or deans, other than the dean of women and dean of men. The spirit of cordiality was nearly universal. It became traditional and spilled over into student-faculty relationships. One of the marks of distinction which likewise became a tradition was the warmth and freedom of "FAMILY" TRADITION communication between student and teacher. Unfortunately, the increase in the size of the faculty and the student body is threatening these basic traditions -- one of the "not-so-goods" of growth. It appears to be inevitable. Once the faculty was, for the greater part, housed in one building. Now we have divisions housed in separate buildings. Once we knew nearly every student on the campus by his first name. Now we don't. The mutual loss is great. Every effort should be made to keep the "family" tradition alive.

numbers and complex problems may threaten this cherished tradition. The influx of students in recent years has brought many to us who are incapable of mastering a collegiate level academic program as well as too many who have little desire to do so. This situation has called forth many devices that pose as academic standards. Most of them are good when wisely employed but too often become "hard boiled" or artificial. that we must employ a system of selective retention under present-day enrollment conditions when there is no selective ad- ACADEMIC STANDARDS mission. Otherwise, true academic standards are difficult to However, there is no substitute for good classroom maintain. instruction for maintaining high academic standards. The student must be our first concern. It is the professional obligation of every college teacher to maintain the highest possible level of instruction for, regardless of class size or student incompetency, it is the quality of instruction that counts. Let the failures fall as they will.

"KEEP GOING, GANG"

St. Cloud State College has grown but, more significantly, it has made progress. Its heritage is behind us but its achievements and contributions are with us. Mistakes have been made. The present is in our hands and the future lies before us. As we profit by the failures of the past we make more secure the successes of the future. As we continue and increase our dedication to the task -- the education of the youth of Minnesota -- we shall minimize future failures. One might be tempted to declaim, "Gird your loins!" or "Take up the banner!" or "Onward and upward!" But permit me just to say, "Keep going, gang."

TWENTY-FOUR NEW FACULTY MEMBERS BEGIN DUTIES; FOUR RETURN FROM LEAVE, SIX OTHERS DEPART

Twenty-four new full-time faculty members have been added for the 1961-62 school year. Some are filling new positions while others are replacing faculty who will not return or are on leaves of absence. The total number of full-time faculty positions is 193, eight more than last year.

Campus Development Continues NEW BUILDINGS START GOING UP THIS FALL

Several major construction projects will be completed or started on the campus during 1961-62 as the college continues a long-range development program.

Ready for use before the end of the year will be a \$283,413 physical education and industrial arts addition to Campus Laboratory School. The project also includes improving and fencing the playground area.

A new steam generating unit will be used to heat college buildings this year. It is housed in a \$71,490 addition doubling the size of the heating plant. An extension of the campus electrical "loop" will be completed by the end of September.

Construction on a \$950,000 Industry and Arts Building will begin shortly after bids are opened and contracts awarded next month. It will be erected west of the Mathematics and Science Building on a block cleared of houses this summer.

Bids will be opened Sept. 27 on a 200-bed residence hall and commons to be built west of Mitchell Hall. Completion is scheduled by next fall. A central food service building will be erected in the same area before the end of 1962.

Completed this summer were a language laboratory in Riverview Building, remodeling projects in Lawrence and old Shoemaker halls and office remodeling in Stewart Hall. Also added were new sidewalks and numerous trees and shrubs,

DANFORTH FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR FACULTY SUMMER STUDY

Funds are available for 1962 summer study by St. Cloud State College faculty members, reminds Academic Dean Charles Balcer.

The Danforth Foundation last year selected St. Cloud as one of 20 teacher education institutions to receive \$10,000 for faculty summer study grants over a three-year period.

NEW GENERAL EDUCATION CURRICULUM INCLUDES SENIOR "CAPSTONE" COURSE

Seniors will take a "capstone" course assimilating ideas expressed in various courses during their four college years under St. Cloud State College's new general education program adopted by the Faculty Senate.

Another new requirement will be a four-hour philosophy course for freshmen. Other mandatory courses are psychology, personal hygiene and physical education.

Although the curriculum will be increased from 61 to 68 quarter hours, superior students may omit most freshman level courses by passing comprehensive examinations.

Under the program, which begins next fall, all B.S. and B.A. students will be required to earn 12 credits in humanities, 4 to 12 in communication, 16 in science-mathematics and 16 in social sciences.

The revised curriculum, representing a year and a half of faculty study and discussion, does not copy that of any other college but is geared to meet specific needs.

POST OFFICE CHANGE COMING

Effective Dec. 29, the college post office will no longer be a post office substation, according to Milton Balgaard, business manager. Although college mailing operations will not be affected by the change, stamps and money orders will no longer be sold at the post office, nor will parcels be accepted for mailing.
