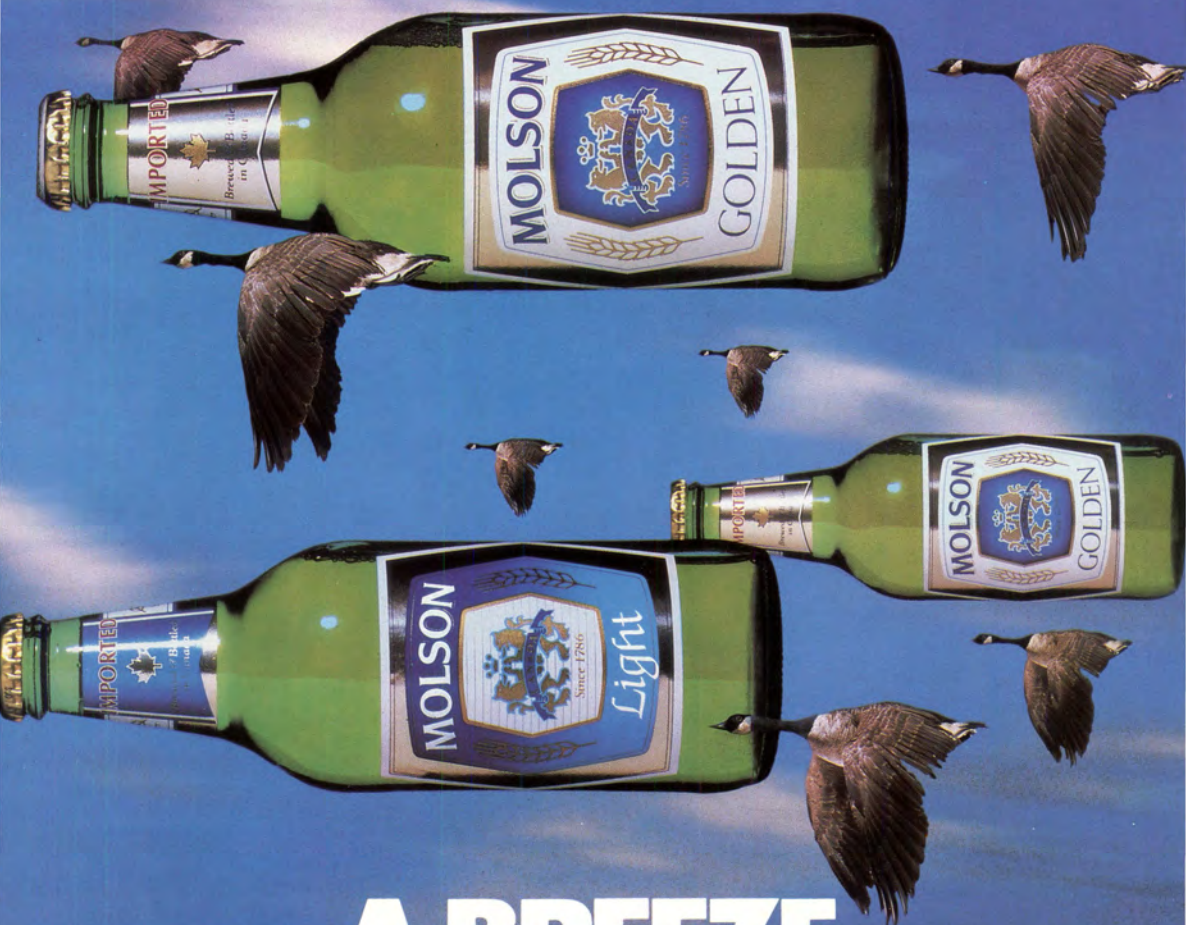

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Founded in 1869, St. Cloud State University was once known primarily as a teachers' college, but now has grown into a multipurpose institution of higher education, serving business and industry as well as educational and governmental agencies through the Colleges of Business, Education, Fine Arts and Humanities, Social Sciences, Science and Technology, and the School of Graduate and Continuing Studies. Located on the Mississippi River with easy access to the Twin Cities and the Beautiful north-central Minnesota lake country, St. Cloud provides an ideal setting for a university campus.

The University has exceptional facilities, including thirty buildings on campus, eleven of which are major classroom buildings. Undergraduate degrees conferred are the Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Science and two-year associate degrees. In addition, students can design their own academic programs with the Bachelor of Elective Studies, an interdisciplinary degree. Graduate work is offered in most departments and the University grants the M.A., M.B.A., M.S. and Specialist degrees.

Current enrollment is over 15,700 full and part-time students.

ADMISSION

St. Cloud State University has entrance requirements so that students admitted can expect to have a successful educational experience. The University uses predictors of academic achievement, such as high school rank, test scores and leadership experience.

Students are eligible for admission if they are in the upper one-half of their high school graduating class in academic standing or have a composite score of 20 on the ACT examination. The University also accepts PSAT and SAT equivalent scores.



New entering freshmen and transfer students are admitted each quarter. Transfer applicants with a C average or better are admitted on the basis of transcripts. Higher grade point averages are required for some majors. Transfer applicants with less than a C average are considered on an individual basis.

The Division of General Studies provides special accommodations for students who demonstrate a need for assistance to succeed in their academic programs. The division may accept applicants whose high school class rank and standardized test scores are below the 50th percentile and above the 33rd percentile. (Students below the 33rd percentile may petition for acceptance.)

FINANCIAL AID

Many federal, state, and university financial aid programs are available for SCSU students who have difficulty financing their college education. The student and his or her family to the extent they are able, have the primary responsibility to pay for the cost of post-secondary education. However, if the student and family are unable to finance the

cost of attendance, the university stands ready and willing to assist students. Financial need does not mean financial poverty.

If a student wishes to be considered for need-based financial assistance it is necessary for the student to submit a Family Financial Statement to American College Testing (ACT) with the proper processing fee.

This form may be obtained from any high school counselor or from the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid. This is the only needs analysis document accepted by SCSU. ACT provides information which enables the aid officer to determine each student's eligibility for assistance.

In addition to the ACT form, each student is required to submit annually the required application materials made available through the Office of Scholarships and Financial Aid each year. Applications are made available usually after January 1 of each year and should be filed by April 15. Applications filed before April 15 will be given priority consideration.

To receive any grant, loan or work assistance a student must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment in a degree or certificate program.

HEAD COACH CRAIG DAHL



A new era in Husky hockey got underway in June of 1987 when Craig Dahl became the 16th head coach in SCSU history and accepted the challenge of building an NCAA Division I hockey program.

That challenge continues for the 1989-90 season when SCSU embarks on it's third

season as an NCAA Division I Independent and looks forward to admittance into the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) in 1990.

The progress of Husky hockey in just two seasons as a Division I participant has been remarkable.

In SCSU's debut as a Division I Independent in 1987-88, the Huskies posted an 11-25-1 overall record. The season was highlighted by SCSU's third place finish at the Dexter Hockey Classic at Maine and the Huskies final game of the season, a 4-3 win over Lake Superior State, the eventual national champion.

A winning record and a post-season invitation to the 1989 NCAA Division I Ice Hockey Championships highlighted the 1988-89 Husky hockey season. SCSU posted a 19-16-2 overall record and received a bid to compete in the 12-team tournament field of the Division I Championships. The Huskies won nine of their last 13 games of the regular season including a seven game win streak from January 23 to February 18.

The challenge of a new season belongs to third-year head coach Craig Dahl. A graduate of Albert Lea (Minn.) High School, Dahl attended the University of Minnesota on a football scholarship in the fall of 1971 but transferred to Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Wash., where he graduated in 1976. While in Washington, Dahl played defense for the Burien Flyers of Seattle.

His collegiate coaching experience began in 1980 when he accepted the head coaching position at Bethel College. Dahl initiated the hockey program from scratch and over five seasons watched the Royals place second in the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference and make the playoffs three consecutive years. His tenure was highlighted in 1985 by his selection as the MIAC Coach of the Year. Dahl left Bethel for the University of Wisconsin-River Falls where he coached for one year. His Falcon squad nipped SCSU for the final playoff spot in the Northern Collegiate Hockey Association in 1985.

In 1986, he became the assistant to Herb Brooks at SCSU and in 1987 took over the reins as head coach of the Huskies.

Morinville brings a great deal of coaching and administrative experience to the Husky hockey program.

Prior to joining the Huskies in 1988, Morinville was the head coach of the North Dakota State University Bison Hockey Club for four years where he enjoyed a great deal of success.

Morinville led his teams to an 85-34 overall record and four National Club Championships.

In 1981 and 1982, Morinville was the head coach of the Fargo North High School hockey team that won back to back State Championships.

Morinville was named the North Dakota High School Coach of the Year in 1980. In 1982, Fargo North was honored as the NDHS Team of the Year.

From 1983 to 1985, Morinville was a part-time scout for Central Scouting of the National Hockey League.

A native of Moorhead, Minn., Morinville is a graduate of Moorhead High School. He attended Concordia College in Moorhead where he earned a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1976. He was the starting Cobber goaltender for three seasons.

SCSU FACILITIES

THE NATIONAL ICE HOCKEY CENTER

A sparkling new home awaits Husky hockey in the 1989-90 season. The new addition to the SCSU campus is the National Ice Hockey Center, a 138,000 square foot building that features two Olympic size sheets of ice - 200 feet long by 100 feet wide and seating for 6,000 spectators.

Located on the south end of the SCSU campus, the National Ice Hockey Center was initiated in June of 1987 when the Minnesota State Legislature approved \$9.5 million dollars for the ice facility as part of a \$30 million statewide Olympic development package.

Features of the building include a spectator concourse, concession stands, ticket offices, eleven team lockerrooms, officials' dressing room, a fully equipped training room, classrooms, offices, weightroom, media rooms, press box, spectator boxes, two zambonis and a complete scoreboard system.

The arena will be home to Husky hockey and during the summer months will host youth hockey camps. It will also be widely used as an intramural and recreational facility by many of the SCSU students and faculty.

Future aspirations for the National Ice Hockey Center include it's use as a national training center for Olympic and amateur hockey, as well as for exhibition events involving hockey and figure skating. The Center will also be used for development camps for players, officials and coaches of hockey.

It is also hoped that the Ice Hockey Center will be a site for sectional and regional State High School Hockey games and special events involving the Ice Capades, Winter Carnival and the development of non-ice activities in the facility.



SCSU ATHLETIC FACILITIES

Husky athletics have many fine facilities to train and compete in throughout the sporting seasons.

St. Cloud State sporting events take place at Halenbeck Hall, Selke Field and Dick Putz Field.

Selke Field, which seats 4,000 is home to Husky football, track and field and softball.

The main gymnasium of Halenbeck Hall has a seating capacity of 7,500. Volleyball, men's and women's basketball and swimming and wrestling all hold competitions in the main area of Halenbeck.

A wrestling gym, an indoor track and tennis courts can be found in Halenbeck South.

Baseball is played at Dick Putz Field located at the St. Cloud Municipal Sports Center, the former home of Husky hockey.

St. Cloud State athletes have access to one of the finest weight training rooms in the upper midwest. SCSU athletes can train in a well-equipped, spacious, free weight room in Halenbeck Hall.

1988-89: After playing defense for the 1987-88 season, Brodt was moved back to forward this season. Brodt played 36 games and finished as the team's fourth leading scorer with 34 points (9 g, 25 a). He scored one power-play goal and one game-winning goal, that came on

During the year, Brodt scored two short-handed and two game-winning goals and averaged .82 points-per game. Brodt scored the Huskies' first short-handed goal of the season Dec. 5, 1986 in Bemidji against Bemidji State University.

High School: A 1984 honor graduate from Alexander Ramsey High School, Brodt earned two hockey and three golf letters. Brodt was an All-North Suburban Conference Honorable Mention hockey selection.

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SCSU HOCKEY, A GROWING PROGRAM

A new Division I hockey program was born in St. Cloud three years ago in a small arena on the west side of the city. Just as a newborn needs room to grow, the SCSU hockey program needed a bigger house to grow into and call its own.

Tonight, the SCSU Huskies move into their new home to begin a new stage of their hockey lives. The National Hockey Center, a magnificent 6,000 seat arena on the south side of the SCSU campus, will allow the fledgling SCSU hockey program to possibly grow into one of the nations best.

The arena itself is one of the finest hockey facilities in the United States and is one of only three in the state of Minnesota to house two sheets of ice. The National Hockey Center will only help the Huskies hockey program to grow and prosper in years to come.

"I believe the new arena will do three things for SCSU," said Craig Dahl, SCSU hockey coach. "First it will allow us to better recruit the top level athletes we will need in our hockey program. Second, it should increase student involvement that we need because it is on the SCSU campus. And thirdly, it will provide an outstanding recreational facility for students and intramural sports."

This is the third year that SCSU has had a Division I hockey team and the program has grown by leaps and bounds during that time. In the first year, SCSU was 11-23-1, but a talented group of freshmen arrived on the scene and things were to be different the following season.

Last year, the Huskies posted a 19-14-2 regular season record and were selected as the lone independent team to the NCAA Division I hockey playoffs, an amazing feat for a second-year program. The Huskies lost two games to Lake Superior State University in the first round of the playoffs, but SCSU caused some eyes to be opened in college hockey circles with its showing.

With only one player graduating from the 1988-89 squad, Dahl was left with a talented core of juniors and sophomores to build his team around. This season, SCSU is 4-13-1 while playing some of the finest college hockey teams in the country. However, the won-lost record does not cloud Dahl's outlook for this and future seasons.

"Considering that we have only three years of recruiting as a Division I team and considering the teams we have been playing are in the top ten in the nation, I think we are doing an excellent job," Dahl said. "We are playing well and staying with teams that would have blown us out last year."

With the Huskies moving into the National Hockey Center, the outlook for Husky hockey is promising. The new facilities will give Dahl and his assistants a key tool in the battle to recruit top players.

"When you are able to recruit the better athletes, you are going to have better teams," Dahl said. "This is a

big-time, modern rink. It will not only increase the awareness of the program in the community, but also among players we are trying to recruit."

The recruiting battle is one of the most difficult to win, especially with the University of Minnesota and other Western Collegiate Hockey Association teams in the area. But, SCSU will be a full member of the WCHA next season, and will have the newest arena in the league, a factor that will work to SCSU's advantage.

"It will not have as much impact on recruiting this year as it will the next. And it will not be as much a factor that year than it will the following year," Dahl said. "If we can schedule some high school and youth hockey in the arena, we will not have to impress them with it, they will already be impressed. There are a lot of good rinks in the WCHA and ours is one of the best, if not the best.

One thing that SCSU does not have on its side at this point in time is the rich hockey tradition that other schools have. But, now that the Huskies have a WCHA membership and an impressive home to call their own, a tradition will have a place to take root.

"It will take some time, but now we have an arena where we can develop a hockey tradition at SCSU," Dahl said.

WEEKEND SCOUTING REPORT

St. Cloud State and the Northern Michigan Wildcats will have the honor of playing the first collegiate hockey series in the National Hockey Center.

The series will match one of the top teams in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) against an Independent team preparing to join the league next season.

Northern Michigan enters the series with a 10-7-1 overall record and a 7-6-1 mark in the WCHA. The Wildcats are fourth in the WCHA rankings after last weekend's action. St. Cloud State enters the series with a 4-13-1 overall record.

Northern Michigan is coming off an impressive sweep of league leading Minnesota-Duluth last weekend in Marquette, Michigan. The Wildcats defeated UMD 6-2 on Friday and 4-1 on Saturday. Junior center Kevin Scott scored two goals, including the game-winner, and freshman center Scott Beattie had a goal and two assists in Saturday's win. Northern Michigan's sweep helped to force a three-way tie for first place in the WCHA between Minnesota-Duluth, Wisconsin, and Minnesota, followed by Northern Michigan. Only three points separate the Wildcats from the first place teams.

St. Cloud State snapped a six-game losing streak with a 4-4 tie against the University of North Dakota last Saturday in Grand Forks. The Huskies lost the first game of the series 7-4 and came back on Saturday night for the tie. SCSU scored two goals in the third period by Chris Scheid and Doc DeI Castillo to put the game into overtime. Goaltender Mike O'Hara turned away three shots in the extra period to preserve the tie.

This weekend's series will mark the third and fourth meetings ever between the two teams. NMU and SCSU first met in a series at Marquette during the 1987-88 season. The Wildcats defeated SCSU 9-1 and 3-1 to sweep the series.

St. Cloud State head hockey coach Craig Dahl, in his third season with the Huskies sports a current overall record of 35-45-4 with the Huskies. Northern Michigan head coach Rick Comley, the only man to coach the Wildcat program is in his 14th season with the Wildcats. He enters this week's series with a career overall record of 280-218-26 at NMU. He has been a collegiate head coach for 16 years, having coached at his alma mater, Lake Superior State, for three seasons.

The Huskies will travel to Denver on December 22 for a single game and will return home to the National Hockey Center on December 29 and 30 for a series against the University of North Dakota.

ALL THE COMFORTS OF HOME

Upon entering the National Hockey Center, one is awed by the size of the building and sheet of ice.

That first view shows a brightly lit, awesome looking arena, whose newness shines.

As you start to walk around the building you begin to see the little touches that make you feel at home; backs on the seats, the SCSU hockey logo engraved on the end of each row, the four concession stands, large restroom facilities, two lobby scoreboards with closed circuit television, two scoreboards with a color message center on the main ice, a full service ticket office, a state of the art sound system, and most every one will agree that there is not a bad seat in the house which seats 6,000 fans. And, behind those smoked glass windows on the east end of the ice are four VIP boxes.

These are the features that the public is able to see first hand. However, there are some other comforts. The media, for instance, are able to work in a press box that can accommodate up to 40 members of the newspaper, radio and television circuits.

In the lower level, one can find eleven lockerrooms, two officials rooms, a fully-equipped athletic training room, a fitness center, an equipment and drying room, a players lounge, a classroom, a manager's office, office space for athletic staff and two zambonis.

The National Hockey Center is a one-of-a-kind in the U.S. and quite possibly the world according to Joe Meierhofer, coordinator of NHC operations.

This claim is brought on by the fact that it is the only facility that features two Olympic sheets of ice under one roof. The practice sheet is located on the east end of the building. An Olympic sheet carries the dimensions of 200' x 100', where as a regulation rink is 200' x 85'.

"At the present time, this is a nicer rink than any college arena in the country," Meierhofer said. "This is a state of the art design."

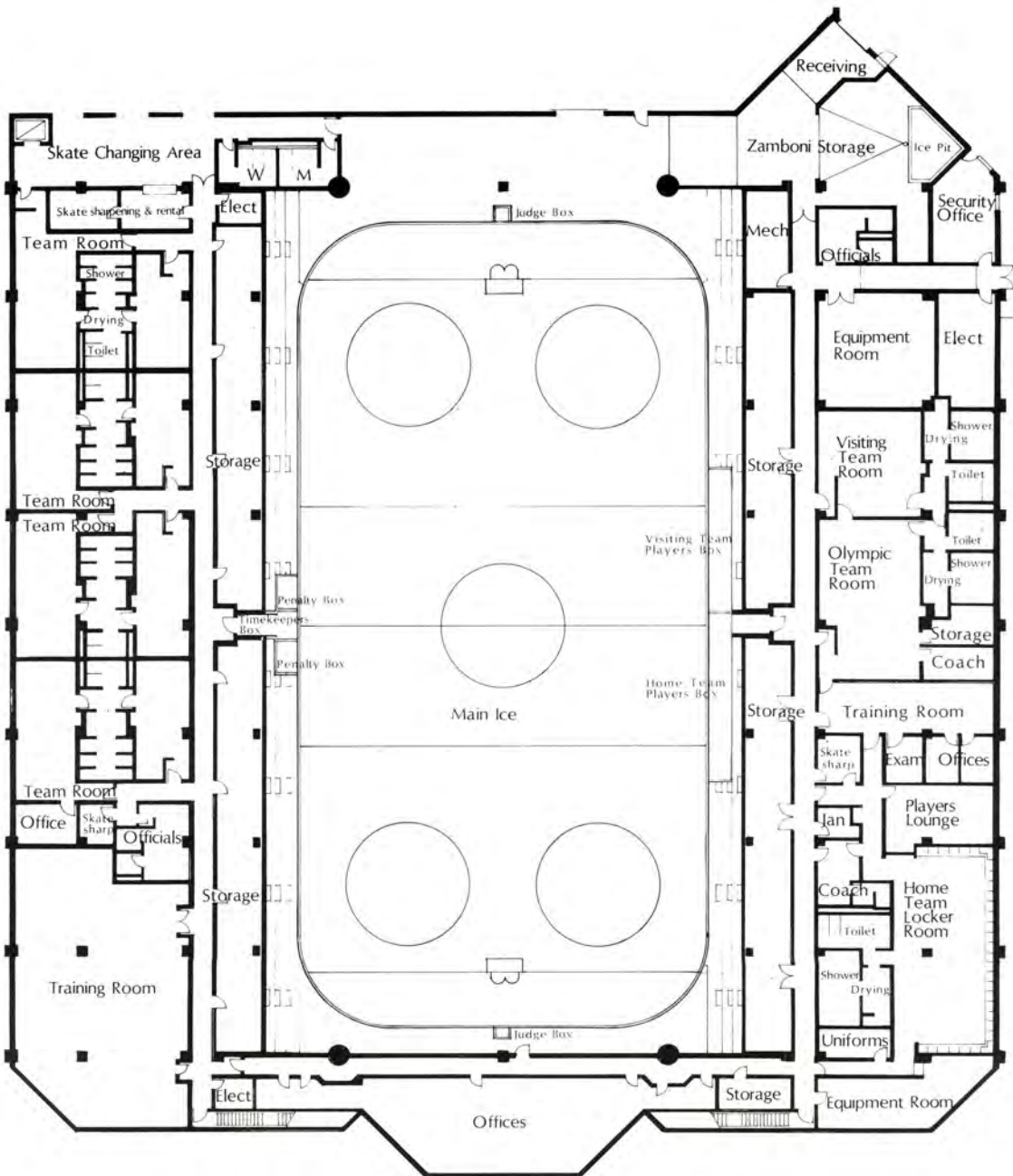
Now that everyone knows what all can be found in the NHC, one might wonder if the arena can be used for anything other than hockey. The answer is that the NHC is a multi-use facility that is already booked for the following activities; classes in fitness skating, speed skating, figure skating, hockey, broomball, and ice ringette, a faculty staff figure skating club, intramural activities in broomball, hockey and ice ringette.

During the summer months, Select Hockey Camps and SCSU Youth Hockey Camps will be held in the NHC.

The public will be able to enjoy other activities as the NHC has signed Discover Card Stars of Ice on February 22 and the Ice Capades on March 29, 30, 31 and April 1.

So sit back with your coke and popcorn and enjoy the comforts of home in the exciting atmosphere of the National Hockey Center and Husky hockey.

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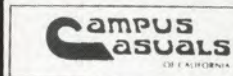

THE WESTERN COLLEGIATE HOCKEY ASSOCIATION

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) as it is known today was born in 1959, but its ancestry can be traced back to the 1951-52 season when Colorado College claimed the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League (MCHL) championship.

Following the 1952-53 season the MCHL was transformed into the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL) which dissolved in 1958-59.

The seven original schools that made up the MCHL and WIHL - Colorado College, Denver University, Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech, Minnesota and North Dakota regrouped in 1959-60 to begin the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA).

Denver and Michigan Tech dominated the league in its early years each winning six league titles in the first 17 years of the WCHA. Since 1976, Minnesota, Wisconsin and North Dakota have become the dominant teams of the WCHA.

Minnesota-Duluth joined the WCHA in 1965-66 and Wisconsin made it a nine-team league in 1969-70. In 1971-72, Notre Dame was added to the league to bring the membership to ten.

The WCHA remained a ten-team league for 10 years, continually sending representatives to the NCAA championships and bringing home numerous titles. Eleven of the last 17 NCAA Championship titles have gone to WCHA member schools.

The WCHA changed in 1981-82 when Michigan, Michigan State, Michigan Tech and Notre Dame joined the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA).

Another change took place in 1984-85 when Michigan Tech returned to the WCHA along with newcomer Northern Michigan to bring the league back to eight teams.

Change will take place once again in the 1990-91 when St. Cloud State University will join the WCHA as its newest member. That will bring the membership to include Colorado College, Denver University, Northern Michigan, Minnesota-Duluth, Minnesota, North Dakota, Michigan Tech, St. Cloud State and Wisconsin.

The 1989-90 season will mark the 31st year of the WCHA, a league that is considered by many to be among the elite of college hockey in America.
