DR. HOLMGREN APPOINTED DEAN OF ACADEMIC ADMINISTRATION

SUMMER PROGRAM INCLUDES WORKSHOPS, TOURS, THEATRE

Dr. Marvin Holmgren has been appointed dean of academic administration at St. Cloud State College by the State College Board. The action was taken March 4 upon the recommendation of President Robert H. Wick and a faculty selection committee.

Eleven workshops, two study-tours, a conference, an institute, an art colony and ten theatre productions will be included in the college's 1967 summer program. Two five-week sessions are scheduled -- June 15-July 18 and July 20-Aug. 22.

Dr. Holmgren had been acting academic dean since August of 1965, when the board named Dr. Wick acting president. He holds a B.S. degree from St. Cloud and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Minnesota. A faculty member since 1949, he has served as professor of education and director of the Bureau of Research. He also was coordinator of graduate studies and in 1964 was named dean of the School of Graduate Studies.

Features during the first session are a computer programming conference and workshops in arts and crafts for special education, stenograph, conservation and school administration. The second session will include workshops in electronics, music education (elementary and junior high), ballroom rhythms, economics education, double-reed instruments and family life education. Also planned are a French study-tour to Montreal (Expo '67) and a geography field trip to Mexico.

CONVOCATION SERIES SCHEDULED

A convocation series on "Man's Improvement of His Environment" is scheduled next month. Speakers will be Dr. Walter Hirsch, sociologist at Purdue University, April 11, Dr. Roger Ulrich, psychologist at Western Michigan University, April 18, and Dr. Athelstan Spilhaus, physicist at the University of Minnesota, April 25. Each will speak at 8 p.m. in Halenbeck Hall. Gerald Mertens is coordinator.

Courses will be conducted both sessions at Theatre L'Homme Dieu and Studio L'Homme Dieu, the college's summer theatre and art colony, both near Alexandria. A National Science Foundation institute for high school teachers is scheduled for July 10-Aug. 18.

CLOSED CIRCUIT TV PROJECT PLANNED

GOV. HAROLD LEVANDER has accepted an invitation to speak at the college's annual commencement exercises at 11 a.m. Friday, June 9, in Halenbeck Hall.

The college has received a \$6,080 federal grant which will be matched by state funds to finance a closed circuit television project next academic year. Televised observations of Gray Campus School classes are planned, according to Ellsworth Bryce, coordinator.

COLLEGE RECEIVES FCC APPROVAL TO OPERATE FM RADIO STATION

Construction will begin soon on a non-commercial FM radio station at the college, according to Ellsworth Bryce, coordinator of radio-television activities. The station will go on the air within the next three months.

The college has received permission from the Federal Communications Commission to construct a 10-watt station which will cover a radius of 12 to 15 miles from the campus. The assigned frequency is 88.5 megacycles. Bryce said the station's tower will be erected on the roof of Stearns Hall. Studios will be located in Stewart Hall until the new fine arts building is completed.

The initial broadcasting schedule will be 4 to 11 p.m. daily. Programming will include classical music, popular music, live musical performances by students and faculty and informative and instructional presentations from network sources and foreign countries. Bryce will be assisted by Garry Hawkins in supervising and managing the station.

The college will observe its 100th anniversary during the 1968-69 academic year. 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JUNE 9 COMMENCEMENT FEATURES ADDRESS BY GOVERNOR LEVANDER

Gov. Harold LeVander will speak at commencement exercises at 11 a.m. Friday, June 9, in Halenbeck Hall. Nearly 1,000 students earned degrees during the one-year period covered by the ceremony. More than 150 faculty representatives will march in the academic procession. Miss Amy Dale and Dr. H. P. Lohrman will be marshals.

Kenton Frohrip will direct the Concert Band and Harvey Waugh the Concert Choir. President Robert H. Wick will confer degrees and induct the graduates into the Alumni Association. A breakfast for graduates, their parents and faculty is scheduled for 8 to 10 a.m. in Garvey Commons.

CENTENNIAL THEME CHOSEN

"A Heritage of Excellence" has been selected as the theme for the college's centennial observance during the 1968-69 academic year. "This theme expresses the idea that the strongest link connecting the past and future of the college is a dedication to excellence," commented Warren Johnson, who was elected overall chairman by the steering committee. Although plans for the observance are incomplete, the committee is considering a building dedication, publishing a new history of the college, formal ball, international drama festival and a series of outstanding concerts and lectures, plus special Homecoming and commencement attractions.

PARKING

Parking on this and other campuses is becoming a critical problem for college faculty, students, administrators, and staff. Here are some facts you may find interesting:

1. The State Legislature is reluctant to appropriate land for surface parking. Many persons may not agree with their views, but some conservative figures may help justify their positions:
SCSC projects a student population of 14,000 by 1975. This will require a conservatively estimated 4,500 parking spaces. At 300 square feet per car (a national standard which also takes into account ingress, egress, and driveways) the total requirement would be 30.5 acres of land. This assumes that 10 per cent of the dorm students would need parking facilities, that there would be an average of four commuters per car, and there would be 1.5 faculty per car parked.
2. Many persons have suggested a parking ramp. The idea is sound, but one must consider the cost involved. At this time the only way the State will consider construction of parking ramps is on a bond retirement basis. The present construction costs of such a structure amount to \$2,000 per stall. To retire the bonds it would be necessary to charge \$30.00 per quarter per car parked or \$90.00 a year.

We have a real problem. It is getting more critical as the years go by. If anyone has suggestions for either short or long range solutions, the Vice President's office of Administrative Affairs will be grateful for your communication.

Report on Legislative Building Commission

Requests for buildings and maintenance needs for 1969-71 were made to the Legislative Building Commission on Friday, October 13, by Dr. Robert Wick and other college administrators. The Commission and several members of the College Board were on campus and heard the request for the next biennium which totalled \$19,070,875 and included three classroom buildings, additional housing and physical education facilities, conversion of several present buildings, electronic data systems, land acquisition, maintenance and landscaping. Dr. Wick said the request was made to relieve current crowding by over 8,000 students on campus and to accommodate an anticipated enrollment by 1975 of 12,643 students.

The college asked for the following:

EDUCATION BUILDING - \$2,969,875 -- Dr. Irvamae Applegate reported 62% of St. Cloud State's undergraduates and 80% of the Master's degree candidates last year were in education. Due to increasing numbers in education, plus a need for non-traditional facilities in remedial and developmental reading, counseling and guidance, statistics, educational measurement and evaluation, teaching methods, special education for the retarded, experimental psychology and graduate study, she asked that a new education building be appropriated for the college.

SCIENCE AND MATHEMATICS BUILDING - \$5,785,000 -- Dr. Donald Sikkink told the group present facilities were designed for only 6,000 students and a ten-period day from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. had already been adopted this fall to accommodate present enrollment. He also explained the need for modern teaching facilities to keep pace with recent developments in the sciences. He asked the new building include a controlled environment room, research greenhouse, sterile culture room, computer terminals, a geology laboratory, observatory and storage area for radio-active materials.

VISUAL ARTS BUILDING - \$2,440,000 -- Dr. Sikkink explained the Art department has quadrupled since 1960 when they were located in Headley Hall and other areas in the building are also growing and needing additional space. He also pointed out the need was recognized five years ago when the initial request for the Fine Arts building was made but available funds did not allow space for Art so the present need is even greater.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION FACILITIES - \$2,205,000 -- Dr. Applegate pointed out that Halenbeck Hall omitted some instructional areas in order to keep within the budget and she requested these be considered at this time so archery, skating, indoor track, and baseball, plus football practice areas could be included. She explained the need for permanent instructional court areas and field development so physical education courses can be offered year round providing a more balanced program.

HOUSING FACILITIES - \$2,515,000 -- Dr. Wick pointed out the need to provide more housing to bring the on-campus percentage to the recommended 45% of the student body. He requested funds to provide a housing complex for 2,400 students southwest of the campus. He also asked they authorize \$1,900,000 for the second phase of the College Center. Additional facilities are needed for conference rooms, food service and study areas for the number of students already on campus. He pointed out during the first year of operation the Center was able to pay all operating costs, bond financing and programming expenses with a small profit left. Dr. Wick also asked the Commission to consider married housing facilities and additional land for parking, recreational areas and future building facilities.

Three important needs for repairs and improvements were placed on the agenda Saturday morning and presented by Dr. Alfred Lease. They included:

CONVERSION OF KIEHLE, WHITNEY, RIVERVIEW AND STEWART HALLS - \$1,252,000 -- Dr. Lease pointed out that the new Learning Resources Building, which will begin construction next spring, will leave space in the old library to house the administrative and service offices. Remodeling of Kiehle and Whitney for offices will cost \$500,000. He also indicated the need to remodel areas in Stewart Hall which will be vacated by music, drama, speech, computer services, business and other administrative offices, which would amount to \$680,000. Additional rehabilitation work is also needed in Riverview for temperature control and radiation. These costs would total about \$67,000.

MAINTENANCE BUILDING - \$330,000 -- The need for additional storage space was pointed out by Dr. Lease, together with the expansion of present carpentry, painting facilities and vehicle storage and loading dock. He cited the numerous spaces now being used around the campus lacked security and accessibility.

ELECTRONIC DATA SYSTEM - \$1,000,000 -- Dr. Lease explained the request for a comprehensive electronic data system which would eventually make possible more individualized instruction, programmed group instruction and an education network enabling several schools to exchange information and library materials. This system would also provide innumerable administrative applications such as student records, finance and planning and development.

REARRANGEMENTS OF DEPARTMENTS - \$1,252,000 -- Permission to reshuffle college departments into more efficient units and preventive maintenance and landscaping were also pointed out to the Commission. Included in this request were funds for sidewalks, parking surfacing and increased utility systems.

Governor's Conference on Tourism

While Homecoming activities were attracting attention all over the campus, Oct. 27 over 200 of the campus visitors were invited to St. Cloud State College on that weekend by the Governor to discuss the state's potential on tourism. The State Department of Economic Development requested use of campus facilities for the conference in July and several administrative offices in Stewart Hall were inconvenienced in order to provide office space for state officials and the press.

Dr. Wick welcomed the group before the Governor spoke and said he was pleased to have such a group on campus to discuss an issue of importance to the entire state. While Minnesota received over half a million from tourism last year this was only about 1½% of the total realized throughout the country. State officials have set a goal of making tourism a \$1 billion annual revenue-producer. Also discussed at the conference were professional standards, conservation and development and regional organizations.

Snow Removal on Campus

Faculty as well as students will be affected this winter by the recently-passed city ordinances regarding parking on campus streets. The alternate street parking system will begin November 16 and will be in effect from 2 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Parking is prohibited on north-south streets Monday, Wednesday and Friday during these hours. East-west streets will be closed to parking on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. In the college area, First Avenue south will be classified as an east-west route.

Two major streets near the campus are emergency snow removal streets. Fifth Avenue south and Seventh Street south are the first streets plowed in this area in event of a heavy snowfall and no parking will be permitted when a snow emergency is declared.

Master Calendar

A system for a master calendar has been suggested by several faculty and administration and arrangements for implementing it are underway. A calendar for the entire campus is being kept by Travis Kent's office in Atwood Center. All student and on-campus groups should schedule their meetings or activities with this office. If a meeting is scheduled in Atwood Center, it will be placed on the calendar the same day.

However, if you would like to invite a state organization or outside group to hold a meeting on campus, you need to contact Beth Rochefort in Information Services. She will help you coordinate the various facilities needed for larger groups and inform the campus community about such meetings.
