The newsletter should come out at least once a month, but more often if news Oct. 31, with newsletter appearing within one week after that. The Business Office should provide basic information on promotions, transfers,

News sources in each building should supplement the information from the Business Office, but more emphasis here should be on meetings attended, newsworthy activities, special projects and information NOT available at the Business Office.

Reporters in each building should identify the source for each bit of information gathered, for purposes of verification and insurance.

Reporters should not promise any staff member that the information received will be used by such-and-such a time, or that it will be used at all. Time and space limitations may require delays, and information not meeting the following criteria will probably be omitted.

Things we DO want to use:

- 1. Promotions, transfers, new people, retirements, resignations since last newsletter.
- 2. Meetings in or outside of St. Cloud (college-related) attended by civil service staff.
- 3. Activities of local civil service organizations: officers, projects, etc.

4. Civic activities of civil service staff.

5. Announcements of interest or concern to civil service staff.

6. College-related projects undertaken by civil service staff.

7. Newsworthy items regarding previous employees ONLY if employees are known by a majority of the civil service staff.

8. Information from all areas of the college, from all buildings; we don't want any building or group of people within a building slighted.

9. News items that may be expanded into stories for the local or state mass media.

Things we DO NOT want to use:

Anything that is not verified factual information.

2. Anything derogatory towards any staff member.

3. Personal information that is not college-related. (for example: birth announcements, showers, parties, greetings from past employees, personal trips or visits, routine vacation plans, items on relatives of employees, bowling scores, etc.)

Two Retirements Bring End

To 57 Years of Service

-December 10, 1969 -

Ruth Gehm To Retire Dec. 30—Faculty and staff members have been invited to a reception next Monday, Dec. 15, in honor of a retiring veteran of 37 years at St. Cloud State College. The get-together, from 2 - 3:30 p.m. in the Herbert Room of Atwood Memorial College Center, is for Ruth Gehm, who will retire Dec. 30. Between 60 and 65 staff members gathered at a luncheon for Ruth Dec. 10 and presented her with a \$50 savings bond. Monday President Robert H. Wick will present Ruth with a certificate of merit, signed by Governor Harold Levander, recognizing her years of service to the state.

Ruth joined the college staff in 1931 as the civil service staff of the library. "There were only four librarians then," she recalled, "and as the secretary I worked on catalog cards, did clerical work and prepared stencils for the library science classes." There were 400 students at St. Cloud then.

Since 1946 Ruth has worked in the Admissions Office. But the specialization that exists today, keeping five full-time civil service people busy, wasn't so common 23 years ago. Students registered in the auditorium of Old Main and Ruth did not only recording, but also typing, mimeographing, post office work and—in her spare time—relief work at the switchboard. Ruth feels that specialization within the college has brought more efficiency. But, she added, "we did things differently because we had to."

Ed Heying Concluding 20 Years at St. Cloud State -- Ed Heying, a building grounds foreman who will retire Jan. 2 after 20 years at St. Cloud, will be the guest at a reception Wed., Jan. 7, in the Civic-Penney Room of Atwood Memorial College Center. Faculty, staff and other St. Cloud people are expected during the gathering from 2 to 4 p.m.

Ed is well-known both on and off the campus, due in part to a job that keeps him continually on the move and seldom in his office in the Maintenance Building.

When he came to St. Cloud there were about 820 students here, he recalled. "There was a saw, a hammer and a miter square," Ed said, "and they had to buy me a hammer when I started." He did general repair work then and carried his tools with him from building to building. The crew then was small, but did painting, plumbing, carpenter work and sall utilities maintenance.

With the growth of the college came added responsibilities and in 1961 Ed became a foreman. "I inherited two pickups, three '56 Chevy stations wagons and one tractor," he said. Today there are 48 different units ranging from trucks to a rotary snow plow and three highway plows. Specialization has come too—there are two groundsmen, two painters, two carpenters and a mason today—and Ed supervises about 100 of the custodial staff and janitors besides 28 Maintenance Building personnel other than mechanical or electrical workers.

"I'll miss the people and the challenge of the job," Ed said. "The faculty and the administration have gone a long, long way to help us, and there are just too many people to mention by name." Ed, who ran his own plumbing and heating store for 17 years before joining the college staff, doesn't plan an idle retirement. He's had several offers of part-time jobs, but insists that he "doesn't want to be obligated." Instead he wants to do some travelling and be obligated this winter only to do some ice fishing.

Miss Denney, 21, was overcome by carbon monoxide fumes Dec. 20. Questionnaires Aid Civil Service Subcommittee—The final report of Civil Service Subcommittee L of the Campus Plan Study is to be submitted soon. Recommendations were formed from questionnaires sent in April to the staff and faculty. A summary of the results follows.

Of the 282 civil service questionnaires distributed 190 were returned. Results: * Sixty-three per cent, or 119 respondents, said no to the question of having 2% more of one's gross pay withheld from his paycheck if the state would match that additional deduction and give one the benefit of the combined amount at age 65.

* By a margin of 58% to 33% the staff opposed abolishing across-the-board salary increases, other than cost of living increases, in favor of selective merit increases.

- * Seventy-one per cent said they were interested in educational opportunities for advancement, greater efficiency or to learn of new materials or ways of performing their job. About 19% said no. On a questionnaire to faculty, of which 191 were returned, 91% favored permitting civil service employees to attend college classes on released time under a formal approved system. Only 4% opposed this idea.
- * A resounding 86% of the staff feel a need for improved communication through an up-to-date local handbook for civil service employees. Faculty supported this by a margin of 68% to 6%.
- * Eighty-three per cent of the staff and 87% of the faculty feel a need for an overlap to permit an employee who is leaving his position to train his or her replacement.
- * Saying they would participate in civil service-sponsored social activities such as picnics, dinners, etc. were 58% of the staff; 24% said no; the rest had no opinion.
- * By a margin of 85% to 4%, the staff voted in favor of having a bulletin board in each building to be used for posting civil service information.
- * Seventy-three per cent favor civil service personnel serving on college committees where applicable; just 10% opposed this suggestion.

* About 57% of the staff said they would like a "personal notes" section in the recently-initiated staff newsletter; 15% opposed the idea and 28% had no opinion.

Other results from the faculty questionnaire showed a divided feeling about changing the present six months civil service probationary period to 12 months with immediate access to earned vacation time. (Yes-34%; no-31%; no opinion or other-35%)

* Only 25% said yes to delegating to the secretarial pool rather than another department in the college the other four hours when a split assignment of clerical personnel cannot be avoided. Thirty-two per cent said no and 41% had no opinion.

Summer Hours Begin Monday -- Beginning Monday (June 15) college offices will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Regular hours of 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. will resume Aug. 24.

Stewart Hall Picnic Planned—The Stewart Hall civil service employees will have their annual picnic Friday, June 19, at Wilson Park. About 70 employees and their families have been invited for a picnic lunch and recreational games.

Parking Stickers May be Traded--Parking permits may be picked up at Auxiliary Services for parking during the 1970-71 year. That office also will act as a clearing house with a list of exchange requests and will try to bring together people who would like to exchange permits. Trade requests may be phoned or mailed to the office.

Newsletter to Include Personals Section--On the basis of responses to a recent Civil Service Subcommittee questionnaire, the Staff News will begin a "personal notes" section in its next issue. Below is an example--a question recently asked in the Business Office. If you have a question you would like answered, send it to Whitney House 205 or give it to your building representative.

Q.--May I use Sick Leave to attend my brother-in-law's funeral?

A.--According to civil service rule #13.8, "Within the discretion of the appointing authority, use of Sick Leave may be authorized in cases of death of the spouse and parents of the spouse and the parents, guardian, children, brothers, sisters or wards of the employee." The answer to the above specific question is NO since brother-in-law is not one of the listed relatives. Annual Leave (Vacation Leave) could be used. In cases where Sick Leave is authorized for funeral attendance, the practice followed at St. Cloud State is to limit such use to three days, with any time off in excess of this being charged against Annual Leave. Harding Rewarded For Ingenuity—A \$5 tool designed by Donald Harding, laboratory technician II in auxiliary services, will save the State of Minnesota more than \$800 next year. And Harding himself is \$41 richer for his effort. The tool is for removing filter elements from the college's three swimming pools. The method previously used resulted in about four broken elements per month. Warren Kelly, auxiliary services, built the tool from Harding's design. A.--No. Civil Service rule 13.7 reads in part: "Vacation leave shall not be granted or accrued before satisfactory completion of six months or its equivalent of continuous full time service. Upon satisfactory completion of such period, vacation leave shall accrue to the employees from the beginning of continuous service." For summarized information on vacation and sick leave rules, refer to your <u>Handbook for Minnesota State Employees</u>.

New Rules on Vacation, Sick Leave--New civil service rules 137 and 138 relate to vacation or sick leave. According to Maurie Smith, business office, the rules indicate that "in no instance will vacation leave or sick leave be granted in increments of less than one hour initially and in increments of less than one-half hour thereafter." Any leave slips showing less than one hour will be posted as one hour and any leave slips showing either ¼ or 3/4 fractions will be raised to the next half hour, he added.

Smith Clarifies Pay, Leave Policies -- Don't let the fact that pay day falls on Friday confuse you, cautions Maurie Smith, business office. Checks received every other Friday are for the pay periods (earning periods) that ended Tuesday, ten days prior to each pay day. Pay periods end every other Tuesday. Checks aren't "held back." It just takes ten days to prepare them in St. Paul and distribute them.

Vacation and sick leave balances are calculated as of the end of each earning period, not as of each pay day, Smith added. For vacation or sick leave, the only hours that can be used are those that existed before the absence. "It is only if and when you return to work that credit can be given for earning leave while you were absent," Smith said. "You never earn leave while you have no-pay status."

Hospitalization Policy Explained--State employees who are over 65 must enroll in the hospital portion of federal Medicare (Part A) before the State of Minnesota will assume the balance of Blue Cross hospitalization coverage, according to Maurie Smith, business office. This benefit is available to such employees at no cost. As explained in a letter to Smith from Blue Cross:

"When a claim is submitted, benefits are paid by Medicare to the extent of the Medicare contract. The deductible amount is payable by Blue Cross under the employees' State of Minnesota contract. In effect, therefore, the State employee should come out with a completely paid bill unless he has a private room.... In the event a State employee does not file for Part A, the State contract will not pick up the balance. You can see the importance of advising all State employees to sign up for Medicare."

Parking Problems Noted--Sergeant Willard Kuehn, campus security, has reported an increasingly large number of complaints about stolen parking stickers and personal belongings and cautions staff members to be sure to lock their cars, offices and desks. The staff also should be sure to get parking permits from auxiliary services in Whitney House for guests visiting the campus, Kuehn said.

Salary Situation Remains Unresolved—The college's business office is as much in the dark as everyone else regarding the current situation with civil service salaries, according to Maurie Smith. "Our crystal ball is not functioning very efficiently these days," Smith said, "and as a result your guess may be the only one which proves correct." The latest situation state—wide, reported in the Aug. 27 Minneapolis Tribune, is that state civil service employees are unlikely to be granted pay increases retroactive to July 1. This report was based on a trip by Sen. Harmon Ogdahl and Rep. John Johnson, co-chairmen of the legislative conference committee on state employees' pay. The two men reported their findings to a full conference committee last Thursday. The committee made no progress in an attempt to agree on the amounts of raises that should be granted after the freeze ends, the paper said. Both houses voted in May to give state employees pay increases, but they haven't been able to agree on the amounts. The legislature adjourned July 31 without giving any increases and is scheduled to reconvene Oct. 12, a month before the freeze ends.

Q & A: Wage Freeze Status--This issue's civil service question concerning civil service pay and the wage freeze is answered by Maurie Smith, business office.

Q .-- What has been decided regarding pay increases for civil service staff?

A.--The matter is still not resolved, for two reasons: (1) An interim committee of the Minnesota legislature has apparently agreed on a pay bill, but this still must be acted on by the legislature when it reconvenes Oct. 12. (2) Regardless of what the legislature does, such action will be subject to whatever limits, do's and don'ts are part of the as-yet-unknown provisions of phase two of the national wage and price freeze program. The only thing that can with reasonable certainty be predicted is that your overall taxes will increase this year, with some of the increases perhaps even being retroactive to last July 1.

Smith Comments On Pay Boost--Maurie Smith, business office, said that indications are that the Dec. 10 paychecks "will include an increase" averaging about ten per cent. He said it is too early to be specific on raises for the specific classes and he doesn't want to build hopes and have them dashed by a later decision of the Pay Board. He noted that "in the absence of a specific Pay Board ruling on the State Employee salary bill, we are simply in no position to predict with any certainty the amount of increase which will finally prevail, regardless of the amount which may be indicated in the Dec. 10 check. For this reason, we feel it is best not to start throwing figures around, and suggest that you continue to keep yourself informed through radio, television and newspapers."

State To Purchase Property For Campus Expansion

Three blocks of residential property in south St. Cloud are being purchased by the State of Minnesota to provide for expansion of the St. Cloud State College campus.

Affected by the land acquisition are two blocks north of the School of Education Building and one block north of Barden Park. Owners and occupants of the three-block area have been notified of the property acquisition in person and by letter, according to Donald Payne, campus planning. They also were invited to an information meeting Jan. 19. Payne said the state will assist in relocating persons affected by the move.

The college's main campus currently consists of 74 acres, on which are erected 27 buildings. Another classroom building is under construction.

Among the six non-metropolitan state colleges, St. Cloud has the most congested campus. With a 1971 fall quarter enrollment of 8,823 full-time, on-campus students, the college has a density rate of 119 students per acre. Density rates for the other five colleges are: Bemidji, 63; Mankato, 32; Moorhead, 49; Southwest, 14; and Winona, 110. St. Cloud's total on-campus enrollment last fall (including part-time students) was 9,509.

Although the college's period of rapid enrollment growth is past, a gradual upward trend is projected during the 1970's. By 1980 the college expects to have about 1,000 more full-time, on-campus students than it does today.

Even if enrollment remained virtually unchanged the existing campus needs to be enlarged to "catch up" with enrollment gains experienced during the past decade, Payne said. The college's enrollment more than tripled during the 1960's.

Early in 1971 westward expansion of the campus was recommended in a long-range study conducted by the Hodne-Stageberg Partners, Inc., Minneapolis architects and planners, for the State College Board. The study pointed out that: (1) Because of the large number of commuting students, the college needs 4,000 parking spaces daily and has fewer than half that number; (2) More than one-sixth of the main campus is occupied by streets and service areas; (3) The main campus cannot expand south, east or north because of natural and man-made barriers. To the south is an industrial area, to the east is the Mississippi River, and to the north is a ravine; (4) The college needs a main entrance to the campus on the west bordering Fifth Avenue near Barden Park.

In February of 1970, in a report to the Legislative Building Commission, the college requested that four blocks of property along the western edge of the campus be acquired during the 1971-73 biennium. Acting on commission recommendations, the 1971 Legislature appropriated funds to purchase three blocks for the college and allocated planning money for an administration building to be erected on part of that property.

In a study completed in 1970, Gerald Gamber, economics, concluded that decreased property tax revenue resulting from the expansion of the college is insignificant compared to the institution's overall economic contributions to the city of St. Cloud and to the greater St. Cloud area.

Maintenance Workers Support Union--Custodians, janitors and maintenance workers overwhelmingly voted Wednesday, Jan. 19, to let Local No. 753 of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees Council No. 6 of St. Paul to be its bargaining agent. The margin was 120 to three. The election affects 136 employees, less than half of the college's 348 civil service employees, according to Thomas Braun, auxiliary services. Clerical-office technicians, engineers and professional and managerial classified employees are not included. Local 753 will now be the bargaining agent for the 136 employees. St. Cloud has had a local of Council No. 6 on campus for about seven years, according to its president, Joe Janski. Last November the council requested formal recognition and approval in St. Cloud. The State Bureau of Mediation Services conducted a hearing on the request in St. Cloud in December. Other officers of Local 753 are Harold Agnew, vice president; Roland Moltzan, secretary; and George Zimmerman, treasurer. The local's next meeting will be Feb. 9.

Reserved Seats For Concert Almost Gone--Reserved seat tickets for the March 3 Doc Severinsen concert will soon be sold out, according to Brent Steele, student activities. Staff members who want such tickets, which are \$5 each, are urged to purchase them without delay. Tickets are available at the cashier's office in Stewart Hall. Staff members should be receiving their inaugural invitations with ticket order forms in the campus mail soon. General admission tickets for the concert are \$2.50.

Kuehn Issues Parking Warning--According to Sgt. Willard Kuehn, security officer, if a staff vehicle without a parking permit is parked on campus, the driver must notify auxiliary services in Whitney House to avoid getting a ticket. This refers to employees with two cars, he added.

Governance Committee Report Due Soon--Inez Kronenberg, civil service representative to the Ad Hoc College Governance Committee, said that the committee hopes to complete its work before the middle of February. The committee has made a recommendation for adoption and this will be sent to all civil service employees the week of January 31. Miss Kronenberg has asked that employees read the report and convey their feelings on the recommendations to her in SH 112, ext. 3143.

TRA Election Date Approaching--Maurie Smith, business office, reminds staff members who have not yet elected an option on the retirement program to do so before the June 30 deadline. He has more information at ext. 3133.

New Groups Have Civil Service Reps--As outlined in President Graham's speech to faculty members Jan. 6, three civil service employees have been named to a new Council of Directors and the Constitutional Drafting Committee. Milton Balgaard, college management officer, is on the council. Leone Bauerly, financial aids, is one of four presidential appointees to the constitution committee. Ed Molde, auxiliary services, is the civil service representative on the committee.

(The following information was forwarded from the state's Employee Insurance Department through the college's Business Office. More information is available from Maurie Smith, extension 3133.)

"During the last session of the legislature, an act relating to nonprofit hospital medical-surgical, dental and other health service plan corporations was passed into law effective last August 1. One section of this law says: 'No participating provider shall have any right of action against a subscriber for compensation for health services which such provider has rendered, except to the extent that the subscriber's contract does not provide coverage for the services or part of the services rendered.'

"This means that state employees covered under Blue Shield may not be responsible for the entire excess charged by a participating physician, a physician who agrees to submit medical service reports for services rendered to his patients who are Blue Shield subscribers. The state's Blue Shield contract pays surgical benefits based on a \$3.75 Relative Value Schedule plus 80% of the Usual and Customary charges if there is an excess not covered by the fee schedule. If the fee schedule (a copy of which each employee should have) does not cover the doctor's charges, Blue Shield will pay 80% of the Usual and Customary charge in excess of what was not paid by the fee schedule. If, after Blue Shield has made its payment, the participating physician bills you for an extremely high balance, the new law may mean that you need not pay any more than the 20% Usual and Customary difference not covered under the State of Minnesota Blue Shield contract.

"It is up to you to help Blue Shield police charges that are too high. All participating physicians have on file with Blue Shield a profile of their Usual and Customary charges for all surgical and anesthetic procedures. As a patient, you will not know what the physician's Usual and Customary profile is. But if you receive an extremely high bill from the physician after Blue Shield has paid benefits, you can and should contact Blue Shield by letter or telephone and explain the circumstances. Send Blue Shield a copy of the bill. They, in turn, will check their records and inform you as to the amount you actually owe. Blue Shield cannot possibly police each doctor's charge. It is up to you to help police high charges and cut medical expenses!

"Before you have any surgical procedures performed, ask your physician if he is a participating physician and inform him that you are covered under the State of Minnesota contract with Blue Shield. If he is not a participating physician, it is his duty to notify you in writing that he does not participate in Blue Shield and may bill you directly for his services. If this is the case, you may be responsible for any excess charges not paid by Blue Shield.

"The law does NOT apply to the State of Minnesota contract with Blue Shield regarding in-hospital, X-ray, lab and maternity benefits because the state contract provides dollar limits on these benefits. The law as it concerns you only applies to surgical and anesthetic procedures as described above."

"at least 20" of his 26 years at St. Cloud he worked the midnight-to-8 a.m. shift.
"I guess there won't be too much that I'll miss once I'm retired," he said. "But

Campus Thefts, Dead Batteries Reported--Sgt. Willard Kuehn, campus security, reports an increasing number of thefts from cars in parking lots and an unusually large number of cars with lights left on in the morning. Following a recent theft of a tape recorder from an unlocked car on campus, Kuehn asked--again--that all faculty and staff lock their cars at all times and keep valuables in the trunk instead of on the seats of cars left in the lots. Kuehn said that during a recent campus check he found that "about three out of every ten vehicles on campus are left unlocked." This parallels an increasing number of thefts, he said.

Women's Progress Council Organizing--Female faculty, staff and students have organized a Women's Progress Council to combat "sexual discrimination" at SCS. The council has gathered these women together to (1) get to know each other better, (2) identify common problems concerning working conditions and attitudes toward women at SCS and (3) develop a constructive program to try to solve some of these problems. Employee Benefits Package Pushed--Minnesota State Employees Union has signed a contract calling for \$45 million in new benefits during the next two years. The contract, first ever negotiated by the union under a collective bargaining law passed in 1971, calls for an approximate 6.2% pay increase starting July 1 and an average raise of slightly under 5.5% the following year. If approved by the Legislature, it also would reduce mandatory retirement from the current age of 70 to 65 by July 1975. The agreement covers shift differentials and severance pay. Also included are improvements in vacation, sick leave and noon meal allowance. The salary increases agreed upon were the same as those recommended by the State Civil Service Board.

Highlights of State College Board Meeting

Here are the highlights of the State College Board meeting May 22 at Southwest State College:

Mankato Presidency--The Board accepted the resignation of James F. Nickerson as president of Mankato State College, effective June 30, and appointed him a distinguished service professor, effective July 1. Kent G. Alm, executive vice president, was appointed acting president until a new president is chosen. A search and selection procedure involving representation from all components of the college community was approved. An attempt will be made to name a successor by Jan. 1, 1974.

Rules and Appeals--Internal Rule 2, Section (b) (7) was amended to grant sick leave "for disability, including temporary disabilities caused or contributed to by pregnancy, miscarriage, abortion, childbirth and recovery therefrom."...The Board noted that the Legislature had passed a bill authorizing a student legal services program at Mankato State College to be financed through the Student Activity Fund. The Board approved the Mankato program as a pilot program, urged the college to implement it and directed the chancellor to inform the governor of the Board's endorsement ... An appeal from the Faculty Senate at Southwest State College regarding non-renewal notices had been heard by the Rules and Appeals Committee May 21. The Board supported the committee's decision to uphold the non-renewal notices since they were issued no later than the Dec. 15 deadline specified in the Governing Rules... Constitutions submitted by St. Cloud and Moorhead state colleges were received. Unless a Board member expresses an objection within 30 days, the presidents will be notified that the constitutions are in effect. If an objection is expressed by a Board member to any portion of either constitution, that document will be considered at the Board meeting Aug. 28.

Budget and Finance--The Board approved action by the Budget and Finance Committee to give the colleges more options in food service contracts for residence hall students. Room and board rates were raised by \$60 per year... Veterans who have served in the armed forces more than 190 days "for purposes other than training" may declare themselves Minnesota residents for tuition purposes... A hearing will be scheduled in August on proposals to grant resident tuition status to Indian students and to dependents of federal employees and servicemen stationed outside the continental U.S... A tuition increase of 75¢ per credit hour beginning with the 1973 fall quarter was approved by the Board after it was noted that the budget approved by the Legislature made a tuition increase necessary... A proposal to prorate the student activity fee on the basis of credit hours enrolled was tabled after representatives of the Minnesota State College Student Association spoke against the plan... The health service fee was increased from \$5 to \$6 per quarter, effective with the 1973 fall quarter... The Board approved a new executive salary schedule affecting vice chancellors, presidents and vice presidents... The Board decided to take no action on faculty salaries other than those with the rank of dean or above who are otherwise deferred "until the matters of the cease and desist order and restraining order have been clarified." A motion was passed "that the salaries of faculty members holding a position of college dean, or equivalent, or higher position may receive a salary increase, consistent with appropriate State College Board adopted salary ranges and salary policy, effective July 1, 1973, in an amount not to exceed an average of 5.1% of their current salary."... Tuition and fees for Minnesota Metropolitan State College and external studies were approved... A staffing plan for 1973-74 and 1974-75 at Southwest State College was approved.

Educational Policies—Six new degree programs were approved, pending acceptance by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission. They are: St. Cloud—B.A./B.S. in Commercial Art, B.S. in Vocational Technical Education, B.A. in Criminal Justice Studies; Moorhead—A.S./B.S. in Vocational Technical Education, B.S. (t) in Earth Science; Bemidji—A.S. for Environmental Technicians... The Educational Policies Committee took under advisement a Mankato State College Faculty Senate resolution objecting to faculty position reduction procedures.

Review, Retirement Policies for Chancellor, Presidents—For the chancellor and the presidents, the Board adopted policies concerning their appointment, evaluation, retirement and eligibility for distinguished service professorships. The new procedures allow for a maximum of two five—year terms for a chancellor or a president. Additional one—year term appointments are permitted. The mandatory retirement age is 65. Each will be evaluated during the third year and the fifth year of the five—year term. The first terms will begin July 1. After serving at least five years as chancellor or president, a person will be eligible for appointment as a distinguished service professor. The policies were proposed by the chancellor and endorsed by the presidents.

Gasoline Shortage--The Board passed a resolution advising state college personnel to help conserve gasoline by driving state cars at reduced speeds and consolidating trips.

Energy-Saving Measures Adopted -- Recommendations for saving energy on the campus approved by the Faculty Senate last week are being adopted, according to William Radovich, Administrative Affairs, and Thomas Braun, Auxiliary Services. Copies of a reminder to turn off lights not in use are being printed and will be posted next to light switches in all campus buildings. Thermostats which have been set at 72 degrees or higher are being set back to 70 degrees where possible. Temperatures in hallways and unoccupied areas will be reduced even lower. Maintenance, custodial and security employees have been instructed to turn off excess lighting. For example, 22 of 34 large outside lights around the Mathematics and Science Center have been disconnected. Other energy conservation measures already in effect include: testing and adjusting boilers at the heating plant to realize maximum heating efficiency, tuning the engines of college cars more frequently to improve gasoline mileage, giving priority in the use of college cars to requests involving two or more occupants over single occupants, urging drivers of college cars to reduce speed, adding more bicycle racks to encourage bicycle riding, cooperating in a daily commuter bus service from Minneapolis to reduce the number of commuting cars, and reducing the amount of outside air brought into buildings for air circulation when buildings are occupied and closing outside air intakes at night during the winter months.

Energy Conservation Measures Adopted -- In response to the heating fuel shortage, President Graham has announced several energy conservation measures to be observed during December. He also has appointed an Emergency Energy Advisory Council to assist him in making fuel-saving decisions. With the exception of Stewart Hall, Atwood Center and Whitney House, all buildings will be officially closed and temperatures reduced from Dec. 16 through Jan. 1. Employees will be relocated from closed to open buildings. All events scheduled on the campus after Dec. 15 and prior to Jan. 2 will be cancelled, with one or two possible exceptions. Graham said the winter quarter is scheduled to begin Jan. 2, as previously announced. However, faculty and staff have been advised to watch the news media for a possible delay. Administrative Vice President William Radovich will announce a more detailed plan to implement the measures adopted next week. Members of the Emergency Energy Advisory Council include the vice presidents for administrative affairs, academic affairs and student life and development, the Faculty Senate chairman, Student Caucus Assembly president and a representative of professional support personnel.

Governor's Order Protects State Employees -- No state employee will be deprived of employment as a direct result of the implementation of Governor Anderson's Cost Savings Program, according to G. Theodore Mitau, Chancellor of the State College System. Layoffs designed for the purpose of achieving savings in connection with the Governor's Cost Savings Program are contrary to the Governor's Executive Order No. 47, Mitau has informed the state college presidents. "Attrition by retirements and voluntary separations are the only acceptable means of achieving personnel reductions under the Governor's program," he pointed out. Mitau said the Commissioner of Administration has established a "holding pool" in his department to receive employees whose positions are permanently eliminated as a result of the implementation of specific cost savings proposals. "By virtue of this program, employees occupying positions to be abolished may, after exercising appropriate seniority rights within their agency, be offered a transfer to a similar level position in the Department of Administration until such time as the employee can be transferred to a permanent position in another state agency," the Chancellor explained. Copies of the Governor's Executive Order No. 47 and the Chancellor's subsequent memo to the state college presidents are on file in the President's Office.

Chancellor Proposes Financing Plan--Dr. G. Theodore Mitau, chancellor of the Minnesota State College System, has proposed that the federal government adopt an interim higher education financing plan tied to the Cost of Living Index to enable colleges and universities to maintain stable tuition rates despite inflation. He made his recommendation at a tuition seminar conducted by the House Education and Labor Committee's Special Subcommittee on Education. The plan would provide annual payments of federal funds to private and public, two and four year institutions based on the annual percentage change in the Cost of Living Index. First step in the plan would be to establish the national average education cost per student--a National Higher Education Cost Adjustment Factor--through a formula provided in the Higher Education Act of 1972. The resulting cost figure would be multiplied by the annual percentage increase in the cost of living to determine the per capita payment to post-secondary institutions. Mitau said if the plan was presently in effect colleges and universities would have received \$235 per student this year, based on a 10.7 percent inflation rate applied to a \$2,200 National Higher Education Cost Adjustment Factor.

Bulletins Arrive This Week--Copies of the 1974-75 General Bulletin will be distributed to students, faculty and staff this week. The new publication is 40 pages larger than the 1973-74 edition. The 1974-75 Graduate Bulletin has already been printed and disseminated.

SCS Awarded HEW Grants-St. Cloud State College has received grants totalling \$44,035 from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. \$39,800 in Title VI-A funds were awarded to purchase instructional equipment, \$10,000 each to the departments of physics and technology for laboratory equipment and \$19,800 to the television department for closed circuit television equipment. In addition to the instructional equipment grants, the college has received \$4,235 in Title II-A funds for the Learning Resources Center. According to George Erickson, assistant professor in learning resources and library and audiovisual education, the money will be used to purchase books.

State Funds Awarded to Remodel Dorm Rooms -- A \$9,790 grant has been awarded to St. Cloud State College by the State Department of Education's division of vocational rehabilitation to remodel dormitory rooms for students in wheelchairs. Three rooms in Sherburne Hall and three rooms in Case Hall will be modified under the program and an entrance ramp will be installed in Case Hall. The project is expected to be completed before fall quarter classes begin.

Art Exhibits at Atwood--Interior spaces, paintings and drawings by graduate student Steve Legler will be on display through August 3 in Atwood Center Gallery. Also, an exhibit of three-dimensional works by graduate student Dan Kirkhoff will be on display in the Atwood Center Gallery Lounge and Ballroom display cases from August 2 through 15. Kirkhoff's silver jewelry and wood sculpture is for sale. Both exhibits are free and open to the public 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday and 5 to 9 p.m. Sunday.

Commencement Thursday—Summer commencement exercises are scheduled for 4 p.m. Thursday (Aug. 15) in Atwood Center Ballroom. Dr. Beverly W. Miller, new president at the College of St. Benedict, will deliver the commencement address. President Charles Graham and State College Board member Arnold C. Anderson will confer degrees on 596 graduates. Meyers Peterson will extend greetings from the Alumni Association. Dr. William LaCroix and Dr. Douglas Magnus will serve as marshals. Music will be provided by Geri Coleman, pianist, and the Brass Ensemble, directed by John Satz.

Reminders from Personnel Officer--College Personnel Officer Maurie Smith reminds classified employees of the following policies:

"Bulletin Boards: For several kinds of information, bulletin boards serve as the legal point of notification. Employees are urged to read material that is posted so that they do not miss information which is of special interest to them. Those employees who voluntarily assist in bulletin board maintenance are asked to maintain them in a neat and orderly fashion, including the removal of out-dated or obsolete material.

"Probationary Employees: An employee does not earn or accrue vacation leave during the initial probationary period. Thus, it is not possible to take time off as paid vacation during such period. However, upon successful completion of such period, the employee is retroactively credited with vacation earnings from the first day on the job. Thus, upon completion of the initial probationary period, an employee will have about 39 hours of vacation leave available for use.

"On the other hand, an employee may utilize sick leave accumulations without regard to length of service. The word 'may' indicates an option by the employing agency. It is the continuing practice of this college to grant the utilization of sick leave by probationary employees. This can be helpful, though not of great consequence, since an employee in an initial probationary period is being credited with only two hours of sick leave earnings each full pay period.

"Time off work by reason of paid holidays and/or paid sick leave and/or paid vacation does not count toward the completion of the required 1,044 probationary hours but does count for purposes of salary progression. The Personnel Office maintains the necessary accumulation records, keeping hourly totals both ways. Any employee serving a probationary period (either initial or promotional) who would like to know his or her status under these rules should contact the Personnel Office, 255-3203."

Copies of the new law have been distributed to vice presidents, deans, department chairpersons and directors.

Highlights of State College Board Meeting

Here are the highlights of the State College Board meeting August 20 in St. Paul:

Residence Rule--The Board intends to revoke the SCB operating policy which requires students to live in dormitories. Among factors which led to this change were lowering the age of majority, recommendations in a recent LEAP study of state college residence hall programs and a proposed law suit by the Minnesota Civil Liberties Union challenging the constitutionality of the policy. Presently all six outstate colleges require freshmen to live in residence halls and Bemidji and Southwest also require sophomores to live on campus. After reviewing the implications of the change at its November 19 meeting, the Board will set a date when the policy will cease to be in effect.

1975-77 Biennial Budget Request--Vice Chancellor Norman Dybdahl outlined the status of the budget development process and reported that a final budget will be ready for approval at the Budget and Finance Committee meeting Oct. 2 at Mankato... The Board approved \$2.9 million for new activities and quality improvement of existing programs... Systemwide biennial requests include women's athletics, \$212,000; affirmative action staffing, \$182,000; staffing to enforce provisions of the Occupational Safety and Health act, \$78,000; inventory maintenance, \$60,000; regional services coordination, \$350,000; and regional historical centers, \$240,000... In order to keep residence hall rates competitive, the Board agreed to include the cost of all curricular, educational and counseling activities now borne by the residence hall programs in the appropriation budget request. The approximate cost is \$800,000...College programs included in the quality improvement request are: Bemidji -- cultural arts office, \$54,000 and environmental studies program, \$100,000. Mankato--nursing supplement, \$148,000. Metropolitanventure fund, \$50,000. Moorhead--tri-college university, \$64,700. St. Cloud--computer instruction program, \$25,000 and child development program, \$52,000. Southwest--Minnesota Educational Radio, \$15,000 and rehabilitation services, \$12,000. Winonaspecial education-early childhood, \$25,000 and nursing supplement, \$123,000... The Board approved a request of \$280,000 to support certain programs presently funded with Student Activity Fees which are determined to have a curricular component. Some examples: drama, debate, band.

Capitol Improvement Program -- The Board approved a general building program philosophy: to provide the kind of physical plant necessary to support a quality educational program. The Board requested Vice Chancellor Calhoun to consult with the colleges to determine unique programmatic needs. The Budget and Finance Committee will review and re-examine the various projects and the priorities assigned to each at its Oct. 2 meeting.

New Academic Program Proposals -- Under a new procedure adopted by the Board, new program proposals will be acted on by the Educational Policies Committee twice each year rather than at each meeting. The purpose of this new procedure is to improve academic planning and coordination among the colleges.

Administrative Council Abolished—After a second public hearing, the Board abolished the the Administrative Council composed of the chancellor and the college presidents as set forth in the State College Board Governing Rules. Special Assistant Attorney General Richard Allyn recommended that the Council be dissolved, pointing out that since Board rules have the force and effect of law, any meeting of the chancellor and two or more presidents could be construed as a meeting of the Administrative Council and subject to provisions of the Minnesota open meeting law. Allyn noted that the chancellor and the

presidents often confer several times each week on matters requiring immediate resolution and to require such conferences to be subject to advance public notice would prohibit the chancellor from frequent and necessary consultation with the presidents... A proposal by Director Tim Penny that the Council be expanded to include vice chancellors and college vice presidents and be required to meet quarterly was tabled and referred to the chancellor's office for revision... The chancellor emphasized that he will wish to call public meetings with presidents and other college representatives to give students and others an opportunity to address themselves to questions of common concern and systemwide implication.

Penny Appointed -- New Director Tim Penny of Walters, Minn., was appointed to serve on the Budget and Finance and the Educational Policies Committees of the Board.

Employees Choose Union Representation -- By a one-vote margin, clerical, technical and professional employees at St. Cloud State College have chosen union representation. In an election Thursday (Sept. 5), 66 employees voted to be represented by Council 6 of the Minnesota State Employees Union, AFSCME, AFL-CIO. Sixty-five employees voted for no representation. William Radovich, vice president for administrative affairs. said the State Bureau of Mediation Services is expected to certify the election results within the next few days. The college and the union will then seek agreement on a contract. Not included in the election were faculty, students, certain supervisory, confidential and administrative employees or other employees already covered by union contract. The question on the ballot was: "Do you want the Minnesota State Employees Union, AFSCME, Council 6, AFL-CIO, as your exclusive representative for the purpose of negotiating with the governmental agency that employs you regarding conditions of employment?" Radovich said 178 employees were eligible to vote in the election as of July 16. Clerical, technical and professional employees at two other Minnesota state colleges -- Mankato and Bemidji -- had previously voted for union representation.

Activity Cards Available -- Activity cards are now available to faculty and staff, according to Brent Steele, director of student activities. Tickets are \$1 and are on sale at the post office in Stewart Hall. The cards may be used for admittance to many activities on campus. A new ticket admission policy for athletic events, established last spring by the Student Activities Committee, goes into effect at Saturday's home football opener against St. John's University at Selke Field. All faculty and staff activity card holders will be admitted for 50 cents to each home football and basketball game.

He has served as consultant and fund raiser for Opportunities Industrialization Center, Inc., Patterson, N.J.; community relations director of the College of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey; and district executive of the Baltimore Area Council, Boy Scouts of America. As affirmative action director, Breese will be responsible for implementing the system's affirmative action plan, designed to provide equal employment opportunity for women "Mr. Breese has the kind of experience in the civil rights and and minorities. human relations fields which are urgently needed to move the state college system positively toward implementation of our program," Chancellor Mitau said. "The State College Board, the presidents of our colleges, and I are deeply committed to the advancement of affirmative action and we are anxious to get on with the job." Breese was the consensus candidate of a Citizens Advisory Committee established by the chancellor to assist in the selection process. Saxe will provide information and answer questions about the 300,000—member organization between 2 and 4 p.m. in the Civic-Penney Room of Atwood Center. Students, faculty and staff are invited. Coffee will be served. A native of Fergus Falls, Saxe holds two degrees from the University of Chicago. She coordinates the lobbying and organizational activities of Common Cause members in congressional districts and states. She has had previous experience as a teacher and Peace Corps recruiter.

United Way Campaign Will Begin Next Week--The 1974-75 United Way Campaign will begin on campus Monday (Sept. 23), according to Keith Rauch, admissions and records, and Ludmila Voelker, English. Rauch and Voelker are in charge of the campus campaign this year. In charge of the staff portion of this year's campus drive are Warren Kelley, auxiliary services; Darlene Klitsch, education; and Carol Epsky, academic affairs. "We have not established a campus goal this year," Rauch said. "Instead, we are asking each individual to establish his or her own goal." Contributions can be made in one of three ways: payroll deduction, cash contribution, or direct billing by the United Way. Each staff member will be contacted sometime after Sept. 23 by their department's solicitor. The solicitor will be able to answer questions about the three methods of contributing and the work of the United Way. The St. Cloud Area United Way goal for 1974-75 is \$407,000. Proceeds from the campaign will be used to help finance 26 social service agencies.

New Policy from Business Office—The business office has a new policy for the authorization of payment for goods received, according to Nick LaFontaine, business manager. In the past, the business office sent a copy of the invoice to the individual who ordered equipment or supplies and asked for authorization to pay the vendor. This has sometimes caused significant delays in the payment process. From now on, when goods are delivered to the department that ordered them, someone will be required to sign the receiving copy. If the goods are unfit for use, the department will have five working days from the date the receiving copy is signed to notify Fran Neidermeier in the business office to withhold payment. If no such notification is received by the business office, payment will be made when the invoice is received from the vendor.

Distinguished Alumni Awards

ARTHUR MORGAN, who attended St. Cloud State College (then State Normal School at St. Cloud) in 1896, lives in the small Ohio community of Yellow Springs, a town he helped revitalize. In recent years he has devoted his energies to human development in small communities. As a young engineer, he drafted a new water control code for the State of Minnesota and was subsequently hired by six other states to revise their water control laws. He was a member of a group that proposed the League of Nations concept to Woodrow Wilson. As president of Antioch College in Ohio, he built it from a dying institution with 40 students to one of the nation's outstanding liberal arts colleges. Under Morgan's leadership, Antioch achieved a new mixture of liberal education, work experience and social training. A democratic community government composted of students and faculty made and carried out decisions normally left to governing boards and administrators. He was appointed by Franklin Roosevelt to be the first director of the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA). His most important engineering achievement in the TVA was the Kentucky Dam, built on a site declared impossible by the Army Corps of Engineers and a team of civil engineers. This dam created Kentucky Lake and opened full navigation between the Tennessee River system and the Ohio-Mississippi system. A renowned engineer, educator and Utopian philosopher, Morgan has served as a consultant to numerous state governments and to the governments of Finland, India and Ghana. He has published 20 books in his lifetime and has been awarded five honorary degrees, the most recent an L.L.D. from Brandeis University in 1972.

EMIL BERGER has been an administrator in instructional research and evaluation with the St. Paul Public Schools since 1972. He holds a B.E. degree from St. Cloud State College (1939), an M.A. degree from Northern Colorado University (1947) and a Ph.D. degree from the University of Minnesota (1962). He has taught at high schools in Minnesota and Iowa and was coordinator of the mathematics program in the St. Paul Public Schools from 1960 to 1972. He has taught summer session classes at a number of major colleges and universities, including the University of Minnesota, Johns Hopkins, Temple University in Philadelphia and Columbia University Teachers College. He is a member of numerous state and national professional organizations, including the American Mathematical Society, the National Education Association, Phi Delta Kappa and the Minnesota Academy of Science. He has been president of the Minnesota Council of Teachers of Mathematics (1953-55) and the Mathematics Section of the Minnesota Education Association (1953-55) and vice president of the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (1952-53). Berger is the author or co-author of more than 60 textbooks, pamphlets, magazine and yearbook articles and achievement tests for secondary school students.

Alumni Service Awards

ALICE BINGER holds a bachelor's degree from St. Cloud State College and a master's degree from the University of Minnesota. She currently teaches at South Junior High School in Hopkins, Minn., and is secretary of the Alumni Association Board of Directors. She is also chairperson of Twin Cities alumni gatherings. Past president of the Hopkins League of Women Voters, Binger is currently active in Common Cause, the American Civil Liberties Union and the state DFL party. She is a member of the NEA, the MEA, the Hopkins Education Association and the Minnesota Speech Association. She has served and continues to serve on numerous committees in these associations. In 1969 she was awarded the St. Cloud State College Centennial Recognition Citation.

ARLENE HELGESON received a B.S. degree from St. Cloud State College in 1951. During the 60's she chaired for three years the Facilities Planning Committee for Atwood Center and for two years the Atwood Board of Directors. She was also secretary of the Alumni Association. She served on committees for the college's Centennial celebration, the inauguration of President Charles Graham and May Bowle. She served as advisor to Alpha Xi Delta sorority after being initiated as an honorary member. President of the St. Cloud Community Arts Council for three years, Helgeson was chairperson of the Mall Germain Sculpture Committee and is director and coordinator for "The Granite Trio," a professional educational film about the sculpture. She currently is chairperson of the building and site committee for the Y.M.C.A. building program in St. Cloud and was recently appointed by Lt. Gov. Rudy Perpich to serve on the Minnesota Esthetic Environment Task Force Committee.

HORACE M. MAYO received a B.S. degree in industrial arts and physical education in 1951 and an M.S. degree in education in 1956 from St. Cloud State College. A Life Member of the Alumni Association, Mayo has served on the association's Board of Directors since 1968 and has been vice president since 1970. He has taught in Minneapolis Public Schools since 1956. He has been a high school and college sports official for 26 years and is a member of numerous national and state educational and athletic associations. He received the MEA Distinguished Service Award (1965); the WCCO-Radio Good Neighbor Award (1970); the NEA Outstanding Service Award (1971) and was recognized by the MEA on Horace M. Mayo Day, June 8, 1974.

JOHN H. WEISMANN holds an M.S. degree in student personnel from the University of Southern California. He joined the St. Cloud State College faculty in 1927 and served as Dean of Men for 32 years, longer than anyone else has held that position. His term as dean was interrupted during WW II when he was selected to serve as director of the college's Civilian Pilot Training Program and later the War Service Training Program and the Veteran's Guidance Center at SCSC. He was also active in the National Youth Administration and the Works Progress Administration. After the war, Weismann returned to his position as Dean of Men and remained there until his retirement in 1962. He was named professor emeritus in 1973 by the Minnesota State College Board. He has served as president of the Minnesota Personnel Association, the St. Cloud Board of Education, St. Mary's School Board, the St. Cloud Serra Club and the Tri-County Action Program.

Large Freshman Class—A total of 2,735 freshmen are enrolled at St. Cloud this fall, the college's largest freshman class in the past four years. President Charles J. Graham considers the increase in freshmen "an encouraging sign." He said the college "appears to have entered a period of stabilized enrollment which will enhance our planning and budgeting." St. Cloud had 2,392 freshmen last fall, 2,277 in 1972 and 2,594 in 1971. A preliminary enrollment count, taken after the tenth day of classes, showed a total of 9,536 students, compared with an estimated 9,870 a year ago at the same time. The total includes full—and part—time students on and off campus. It is expected to be higher when a final count is reported. The full—time equivalent (FTE) enrollment for the college is 8,250, down about 1.6 per cent from fall quarter 1973. The FTE count is the number of credit hours students have registered for divided by a credit—hour load of 15. It is the basis for legislative appropriations to the college. The total enrollment includes 8,617 on—campus students, an increase of 15 over last fall. There is a slight decline in transfer students, from 779 to 749.

Highlights of State College Board Meeting

Here are the highlights of the State College Board meeting November 19 at Winona State College:

Residence Hall Policy Changed -- The Board ended its policy that freshmen must live in college residence halls, effective winter quarter. Mandatory contracts in force at the beginning of winter quarter will be cancelled.

Non-Intoxicating Malt Liquor Policy Adopted -- The Board approved limited sale and consumption of non-intoxicating malt liquor at state colleges. The sale and consumption are subject to the approval of the administration at each college. Such temporary beer sales were legalized by the legislature in its last session if a temporary permit is granted by the governing municipality. Each college will draft regulations to cover sales and consumption.

New Academic Programs Approved -- The Board approved nine new academic programs to be forwarded to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, where approval also is necessary before implementation. The programs are: Mankato--B.A./B.S. Major in Astronomy, Minor in Geology, A.S. in Medical Laboratory Technician, B.A./B.S. Major in Minority and Ethnic Studies, B.S. Major in Construction Management, B.S. Minor in Scandinavian Area Studies; Moorhead--Minor in Women's Studies; St. Cloud--Minor in Women's Studies, Minor in Minority Studies.

Academic Program Review -- Chancellor G. Theodore Mitau made these comments regarding the Academic Program Review now in progress: "Faculties quite properly have raised questions and expressed concerns about strategies of program review as improperly focusing excessive attention on readily accessible and ascertainable quantitative indices of productivity, such as number of students and credit hours. Let me stress that it is the conviction of this office that one of the great values of the program budget approach is its potential for identifying the necessary financial support levels required to sustain and enhance the quality of those academically and intellectually important disciplines and programs which are central to the liberal arts offering of a comprehensive institution but which may not attract large enrollments. Career education can never be viewed as the only point of emphasis in a viable and sound fouryear academic institution. Indeed, the liberal arts have always been and will continue to be at the heart of any educational program that purports to prepare individuals to become thinking, sensitive and envisioned men and women who will play an important role in their community and state." Several Board members voiced their support of this statement.

Mankato Constitution Approved -- A new constitution for Mankato State College was approved after the document had been amended to give students a stronger voice in decision making at the college.

<u>Paid Media Advertising Policy Adopted</u>—The Board adopted guidelines for the use of paid media advertising by the state colleges, making the presidents responsible for advertising budgets, restricting advertising to primary service areas and establishing a committee to coordinate advertising in the metropolitan Twin Cities area.

Budgets Reallocated -- Fall quarter budgets were reallocated according to actual enroll-ments.

Other Items--The presidents and chancellor were authorized to make surplus equipment lease agreements... Nine Affirmative Action salary appeals were denied... The chancellor reported on the status of faculty bargaining and indicated that new construction projects, although deferred by the board, can be implemented if the legislature and governor decide that cost trends favor immediate action.

December 4, 1974

Cost-of-Living Increase Coming--All classified personnel will receive a cost-of-living increase in Jan., according to the personnel department. The increase will be: 22 cents an hour for schedule B and C and 4.4 per cent for schedule A. The increase will be effective January 8 and will first appear on the January 31 paychecks. The adjustment will not change the salary step of any employee but increases the value of all steps.

President Calls For New Goals—President Charles J. Graham has initiated a procedure for developing a new statement of goals for the college. "After the commission has had an opportunity to work on them, I will submit them to the College Senate," he explained. "I hope to be able to present a statement of goals for the college to the State College Board by the end of the academic year." Pay Increases To Appear on Jan. 31 Checks—The cost-of-living adjustment for all classified employees will appear for the first time on the checks scheduled for distribution on Friday, Jan. 31, according to Maurie Smith, personnel. The cost-of-living adjustment is 22 cents an hour for all Schedule B and C employees and 4.4 per cent for all Schedule A employees. The computation of gross earnings for some employees, Smith explained, will also be complicated by such items as a mid-period step progression, differential and overtime pay. All new pay rates appearing on the Central Payroll computer tapes will be individually checked by the personnel office to insure accuracy, Smith said, but this cannot be completed until sometime in February. Smith asked that employees wait until the personnel office completes its audit before they contact the office to report errors.

Monday's Closing -- A procedure has been established for classified employees to either make up work hours missed last Monday (Jan. 13) because the college was closed or to take the day as a vacation day, according to William Radovich, vice president for administrative affairs. "According to civil service rules and the contract signed recently by Council 6 and six of the state colleges, the college cannot compensate employees for services not rendered," Radovich explained. "Also, some employees did work on Monday and those who did will not receive overtime pay. In fairness to those employees, we must ask those who did not work to either make up the time missed or take the day as a vacation day." If an employee wants to make up the time missed, Radovich said, he or she must do so this Saturday (Jan. 18). "Again, we are bound by Civil Service rules and the contract," Radovich explained, "Because any time worked beyond eight hours in one day or 40 hours in one week must be compensated for at time-and-ahalf rate, Saturday is the only day we can offer the opportunity to make up time missed. If employees were allowed to make up the time during any regular work day or on any Saturday after this, they would exceed the 8-hour-per-day, 40-hour-per-week rule and would have to be paid overtime." Employees who do work Saturday should submit a yellow overtime slip, signed by the employee and supervisor. The overtime slip should state "Monday, Jan. 13 make-up" as the reason for overtime work. If no overtime slip is received, the time will be charged against the employee's vacation accrual and/or payroll (in case the employee does not have sufficient vacation time remaining).

Fishing Contest Underway—A fishing contest sponsored by the Atwood Board of Governors Journeymen is now underway and will continue through Feb. 15. Trophies will be awarded for the largest panfish (sunfish or crappie, angeled), the largest walleye (angeled) and the largest northern (angeled or speared). Highlights of State College Board Meeting

Here are the highlights of the State College Board meeting March 14 at Southwest Minnesota State College, Marshall:

New Members Introduced--Three new members were introduced and participated in the deliberations. They are: Mrs. Mary T. Phillips, St. Paul, Robert W. Irvine, Detroit Lakes, and Donald G. Jackman, Minneapolis. Arnold C. Anderson, Montevideo, remains on the Board following reappointment for a six-year term by Governor Anderson. Resolutions of appreciation for service were adopted for departing members Mrs. Elizabeth K. Johnson and Rev. A. L. Stenberg.

Committees Appointed-Board President Frank G. Chesley made the following committee appointments: Budget and Finance-Anderson, chairman, Coughlin, Jackman, Penney, Rothchild; Educational Policies--Rothchild, chairman, Penney, Phillips, Rinke, Casmey; Rules and Appeals--Rinke, chairman, Rothchild, Irvine, Coughlin, Phillips. (Chesley is an ex-officio member of all committees.)

Affirmative Action Report—Charles Breese, Affirmative Action director for the State College System, reported that women and minorities are being sought for faculty, administrative and staff positions. Of 2,376 total faculty, 4.5% (118) are minorities, both men and women, only slightly less than the state's minority population of 4.9%. Faculty women number 946, or 38% of total faculty. This figure is 1% less than the state level and considerably above the 24.4% national level of faculty women in colleges and universities.

Campus Buildings Available—Southwest will make three campus buildings available for use by other state agencies. President Jay Jones recommended that the buildings be assigned to agencies with functions consistent with the college's mission as a regional service center. Included are a 33,400-square foot administration building and two residence halls which could be used as training and conference centers.

Mankato Campus Consolidation -- A proposal was approved to close the lower campus of Mankato and move all operations to the upper campus, pending legislative appropriations of some \$10 million to finance the move. The proposal was made in a consultant's study initiated by the Legislature and reported to the Board in January. If funded, the project could be completed in about three years. Included in the proposal's approval was a statement of support for the continuation of the Wilson Campus School "as performing a vital and viable role in teacher education for the State of Minnesota."

Preliminary Budget Allocations—Preliminary 1975-76 budget allocations for the colleges were approved. Allocations for teaching—formula "earned" positions are:
Bemidji 221.94, Mankato 482.34, Moorhead 244.22, St. Cloud 434.88, Southwest 116.00, Winona 188.32. The St. Cloud and Winona figures represent increases and the Bemidji and Mankato figures are decreases. Moorhead and Southwest figures remain unchanged.
(Not included are some teaching positions held in reserve and some support positions.) Classified staffing allocations are not yet determined. All allocations may require modification after legislative appropriations are made and fall quarter enrollments are determined.

State College Board Meeting Highlights (Continued)

"Meet and Confer" Session--Determining that the prospect for negotiating a collective bargaining agreement with faculty members in time for legislative review this session "is virtually nil," the Board instructed its negotiating team to "meet and confer" with interested faculty organizations on economic issues as permitted by the cease and desist order of the director of mediation services. If the "meet and confer" session can be scheduled the first week of April, the Board will review the information obtained at its Budget and Finance Committee meeting scheduled for the week of April 14 and forward its recommendation to appropriate legislative committees immediately afterwards. Members of the Board's "meet and confer" team are: Vice Chancellors Garry Hays and Norman Dybdahl; President Roland Dille, Moorhead; Vice President John Tomlinson, St. Cloud; and Joe Flynn, legal counsel.

Salaries of Administrators--The Board authorized a study of salaries of chief administrators in the State College System to develop a salary recommendation for those positions.

Residence Hall Rental Rates--A decision of residence hall rental rates for 1975-76 was delayed until the April meeting of the Budget and Finance Committee. Student input will be sought to determine to what extent services can be reduced to lessen rental rate increases.

Summer Session Fees--Colleges received authorization to assess student union, student activity, student health service and student union program fees to on-campus students on a per-credit-hour basis for the summer of 1975. Such fees will be collected at the rate of \$2.25 per credit hour with a maximum of \$18 per summer session or \$36 per summer quarter.

<u>Prorated Room and Board Charges</u>—Colleges may prorate quarterly room and board charges to reflect actual days of service provided in instances where a student gives advance notice that academic program requirements will result in the student needing such services for a specified period of time shorter than a full academic quarter.

Rules and Appeals -- The Board accepted a report from the Rules and Appeals Committee denying a termination appeal by Donald Newcomb, Mankato, and appointing a hearing officer to consider the termination appeal of Joseph McKenna, Bemidji.

Reciprocity Agreement -- The Board endorsed the continuation of a tuition reciprocity agreement between Minnesota and Wisconsin established by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission.

State University Concept--The Board endorsed the concept of changing the Minnesota State College System to a Minnesota State University System as incorporated in House File 309 (Pehler bill).

Sounds Of Blackness Rescheduled—The Sounds of Blackness concert, previously scheduled for March 26 and cancelled because of the blizzard, will be presented at 8 p.m. tonight (April 11) in the Atwood Center Ballroom. The Sounds of Blackness is a choral group from Macalester College directed by Gary Hines. The focus of the group is on black identity and history through music. The program will include selections of African, folk, spiritual, gospel, rhythm and blues and contemporary music. Sponsored by the Atwood Board of Governors and the Minority Culture Center, the performance is free and open to the public.

KVAC To Be Dedicated In September—A full week of festivities is now being planned for mid—September to celebrate the dedication of the Kiehle Visual Arts Center, according to Dean Menagh, fine arts. Concerts, exhibitions, plays, dances, banquets and a symposium will be part of the celebration. James Roy, chairman of the art department, is head of the planning committee. "While the dedication centers on the visual arts," Menagh explained, "it will be used to focus attention on all the arts and on arts groups in the community as well as on the campus." Kiehle Hall served as the college's library from its construction in 1952 until May, 1971, when Centennial Hall was completed. Renovation of the building into a visual arts center began in late 1973. The renovated building centralizes all programs of the art department, previously housed in five locations on campus including two dormitory basements, a room off a gymnasium and an outdoor service yard. In addition to a gallery and sculpture deck, the building houses studios for drawing, painting, photography, print—making, weaving, design, jewelry, graphics, crafts, art education, ceramics, sculpture, casting, foundry, glass blowing and art history.

Hours at Halenbeck Pool--Halenbeck Hall Pool is open these hours for recreational swimming: Endurance Swimming: Monday through Thursday, 6:30-7:30 a.m., and Monday through Friday, noon-1 p.m. Open Swimming: Monday through Friday, 4-5:30 p.m., and Saturday and Sunday, 1:45-3:45 p.m. No caps are required during these hours.

Theatre L'Homme Dieu Closed For Renovation—Construction will replace production this summer at Theatre L'Homme Dieu, SCS's summer theatre near Alexandria. The theatre will be closed so that facilities can be renovated in preparation for a season of plays related to the Bicentennial theme in 1976, according to President Charles J. Graham. Graham heads the board of directors for the Alexandria—SCS Performing Arts Foundation, the non-profit corporation which manages the theatre. Financing is being sought so that the lodge which houses the theatre company can be remodeled and residence cottages erected on the 23-acre site, according to Graham. No renovation is needed for the 260-seat theatre. Founded in 1961, Theatre L'Homme Dieu has operated for 14 seasons under several directors. Each year the professional company has been supplemented by theatre department faculty and students at the college. Total attendance each season has ranged from 7,306 to 10,950. A wide variety of productions has been presented, including musicals, light comedy and serious drama. Supported by both public and private funds, Theatre L'Homme Dieu last year received a \$2,500 grant from the Minnesota Arts Council.

John Tomlinson Named President Of Mesa College-John Tomlinson, vice president for academic affairs, has been appointed president of Mesa College in Grand Junction, Colo., effective July 1, 1975. Tomlinson has served as academic vice president at SCS since June 15, 1972. He came to St. Cloud from Fort Hays (Kan.) State College where he was chairman of the Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences. President Charles J. Graham said he was pleased that Tomlinson had been offered the position "because he has demonstrated in his work here that he is highly qualified to be a college president." Graham added, however, that Tomlinson's departure "will be a regrettable loss to St. Cloud."

Growe, who holds a B.S. degree from SCS and a Special Education Certificate from the University of Minnesota, has taught at schools in Bloomington, Minneapolis, and St. Paul. She served as state Representative from District 40A during the 1973-75 legislative session before assuming the office of Secretary of State last January. President Charles J. Graham and new Minnesota State College Board member Robert Irvine will confer over 960 degrees. Retiring faculty member Mary Scharf, psychology, will be honored at the ceremony. Scharf has taught at the college for 27 years. Charles Sartell, member of the SCS class of '49, will extend greetings from the Alumni Association. Marshals will be Francis Bleick, women's physical education, and Robert Prout, criminal justice studies. Music will be provided by the Concert Choir, directed by Charles Peterson, and the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, directed by R. Dennis Layne.

Gillett Named Acting Academic V.P.--President Charles J. Graham has appointed Lowell "Ted" Gillett acting vice president for academic affairs effective July 1. Gillett will fill this position until a permanent appointment is made to replace John Tomlinson, who has resigned to become president of Mesa College in Grand Junction, Colorado. Gillett has been dean of the School of Graduate Studies since 1968. "We feel very fortunate that a person of his proven abilities is willing to undertake this heavy responsibility on an acting basis," Graham said.

Highlights of State College Board Meeting

Here are the highlights of the State College Board meeting May 28 at Bemidji State College:

Officers Elected -- Frank Chesley was reelected Board president. Kennon Rothchild was elected vice president, succeeding Arnold Anderson. Anderson was elected treasurer.

University Designation—Temporary name changes for the seven state colleges were approved, effective Aug. 1, until a decision is made by the attorney general's office regarding the use of "Ninnesota" in name designations. The Legislature passed a bill granting university designation for the colleges but specifying that the state name could not be used. The Board office has requested a ruling on whether regional names could include "Minnesota," such as Southwest Minnesota State University. Final name designations will be approved at the August Board meeting. The temporary names are: Mankato State University, Minnesota Metropolitan State University, Hoorhead State University, Northern State University—Bemidji, St. Cloud State University, Southwest State University and Winona State University. The Board will be designated as the Minnesota State University Board.

Tuition Increase—The following tuition increases were approved: For resident undergraduates, \$9 per credit starting next fall and \$9.25 starting next summer, compared with \$8 now; for non-resident undergraduates, \$18 next fall and \$18.50 next summer, compared with \$16.25 now; for resident graduate students, \$11.50 next fall and \$12 next summer, compared with \$10.25 now; for non-resident graduate students, \$22.50 next fall and \$23.25 next summer, compared with \$20.25 now.

MPIRG Decision—A move to end the Board's arrangement allowing the Minnesota Public Interest Research Group (MPIRG) to collect a fee from state college students was defeated. Instead, procedures for collecting and regulating the MPIRG fee will be decided by each college. The board requires, however, that a majority of full-time students on a campus support the program as evidenced by petition and that students be notified on the fee statement that the MPIRG fee is not mandatory and is refundable if collected.

Salary Plan Adopted—A salary plan was adopted for unclassified employees not in the faculty collective bargaining unit. The plan establishes 14 salary grades with a minimum and maximum salary range in each grade. An appeal procedure is included. The Board granted an 8.8% salary increase to all employees under the plan on an across—the—board basis except that any adjustments in excess of 10% of the range maximum were limited to 2/3rds of the unused balance of the across—the—board adjustment. Also, 5.0% was reserved for adjustment to range minimum and for performance, promotion and inequity adjustments within the limits of the established salary ranges. An additional 1.2% was reserved for adjustments necessitated by administrative reviews.

Educational Policies—The Board approved the following new academic programs: B.A. and B.S. minors in audio visual media at Winona, B.A. and B.S. minors in statistics at Mankato and B.A. and B.S.(t) minors in Ojibwe language at Bemidji. A proposal for a B.S. major in community education at Mankato was deferred. A specialist degree in educational administration to be offered by Tri-College University (Moorhead, Concordia and North Dakota State) was approved, contingent on approval by the North Dakota Board of Higher Education. Mankato officials announced that by 1976-77 the institution must terminate 41 positions (31 teaching, 10 administrative/service) because of a decrease in credit hours.

State College Board Meeting Highlights (Continued)

Student Union Program Fee Increased -- The Board approved an increase in the student union program fee for full-time on-campus students from \$3 to \$5 per quarter and from \$1.50 to \$2.50 per summer session.

Rules and Appeals—A new procedure was adopted for handling proposals and resolutions submitted to the Board. Items submitted to the Chancellor's Office 14 days prior to a Board meeting will be placed on the appropriate committee agenda. The Board president may refer to the appropriate committee proposals and resolutions submitted directly to the Board. Appeals by Joseph McKenna and Hilmer Brehmer, Bemidji, were delayed. An appeal by Walter Reed, Mankato, for a second year's leave of absence was denied.

Emeritus Professors Designated--Four Bemidji professors retiring this year with a combined total of 124 years of service were designated as emeritus professors. They are John Glas, John Brady, Phil Sauer and Harold Peters.

Chancellor Commended--Both the Board and the state college presidents passed resolutions commending Chancellor G. Theodore Mitau for his successful efforts with the Legislature on behalf of the State College System.

Listed by years of service to the college, the retiring employees are: Reuben Hopfner, general repairman, 22 years, 5 1/2 months; Phillip Dobis, janitor, 18 years, 11 1/2 months; Ray Welch, boiler engineer, 16 years, 10 months; Peter Holper, janitor, 12 years, 9 1/2 months; Sylvia Howe, custodian, 10 years, 5 months; Eldon Lockhart, janitor, 10 years, 4 1/2 months; Felix Kieke, janitor, 9 years, 2 months; Joseph Bauer, janitor, 7 years, 8 1/2 months, and Philomena Teuber, custodian, 6 years, 9 1/2 months. President Charles J. Graham presented each with a certificate recognizing their service to the state at a ceremony in his office June 12. The certificates were signed by Governor Wendell Anderson. "Visitors to St. Cloud State," Graham said, "often tell me they are impressed with the condition of our physical plant (buildings and grounds). Those compliments are a tribute to each of you." All born between July 1, 1907, and June 30, 1910, these employees are in the second group of state employees to be affected by a lower mandatory retirement age. The 1973 legislature lowered the mandatory retirement age from 70 to 65 for all employees covered by the Minnesota State Retirement System (MSRS). Under the old regulations, employees had the option of working past age 65 or retiring and collecting benefits at that age.

VFW Conference On Campus This Week--The Minnesota Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) will hold its annual meeting on the SCS campus today-Sunday (June 18-22). Aug. 1 Is University Day-St. Cloud State College becomes St. Cloud State University Friday, Aug. 1. Students, faculty, staff and community representatives are invited to an informal University Day coffee hour and ceremony between 10 and 11 a.m. in the Gallery Lounge of Atwood Center. President Charles J. Graham will present appreciation awards to two state legislators who were instrumental in obtaining university designation for the college-Senator Jack Kleinbaum and Representative James Pehler, both of St. Cloud. St. Cloud State University will be the fifth name for the 106-year-old educational institution. It was established in 1869 as the Third State Normal School. The name was State Normal School at St. Cloud from 1894 to 1921, when the designation was changed to St. Cloud State Teachers College. Since 1957 the name has been St. Cloud State College. The other six state colleges also will be renamed universities and the State College Board will be designated as the Minnesota State University Board. The name changes were authorized by the 1975 Minnesota Legislature.

Summer Credit Hours Increase—SCS students are enrolled for more credit hours this summer than last summer, according to Paul Ingwell, director of Institutional Research. In a preliminary enrollment report for the summer quarter (both terms), Ingwell said the college has 2,586 full-time equivalent (FTE) students enrolled for 38,808 credit hours. The number of FTE students is a statistical measure, determined by dividing total credit hours by 15, which is considered to be a normal credit load. Last summer there were 2,540 FTE students enrolled for 38,128 credit hours. Ingwell said he was particularly impressed by the increase in undergraduate credit hours, up 3.1 per cent from last year. Students registered for nearly twice as many undergraduate credits as graduate credits—25,775 compared to 13,033. Graduate credit hours remained stable, however, decreasing only six-tenths of one per cent. The percentage increase in total credit hours was 1.8. Final enrollment figures probably will be higher than the preliminary figures, Ingwell said.

Enrollment Jumps 10.4 Per Cent This Year--A record number of 11,141 students enrolled at SCSU this fall represents a 10.4 per cent increase over last year, according to the preliminary enrollment count. About 80 per cent of the total increase is in oncampus enrollment. The full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment for the university is 8,934 up 585 or 7 per cent over last year. On-campus students total 9,266, an increase of 595 or 6.9 per cent over 1974. Off-campus students increased from 1,422 to 1,875, a 38 per cent difference. The university enrolled 798 transfer students, 56 more than last year. New entering freshmen totaled 1,905, an increase of 216 or 12.8 per cent. The final enrollment report is expected to be slightly higher than the preliminary report.
