## COLLEGE SEEKS \$6.5 MILLION TO CONTINUE BUILDING PROGRAM

St. Cloud State College has placed top priority on a new library in requesting more than \$6.5 million from the 1965 Legislature to continue the long-range building program.

In a report March 20 to the Legislative Building Commission, President George F. Budd also asked for a classroom building for business, more residence halls, married student housing, land acquisition and heating improvements. The ten-member commission will make recommendations to the Legislature early next year.

Dr. Budd told the commission that if present trends continue, the college's enrollment will nearly double in seven years -- from 4,177 full-time resident students last fall to 8,000 by 1970.

The proposed \$2.7 million library would replace Kiehle Library, which was planned for an enrollment of 2,000 and cannot be enlarged. The present library would be converted into an administration building. The new library would provide about 2,700 reader stations and space for 400,000 volumes. The library now contains 106,766 volumes.

## SEVEN GRANTED LEAVES BY STATE COLLEGE BOARD

Three faculty members have been granted sabbatical leaves and three have been granted leaves of absence for the 1964-65 school year by action of the State College Board. In addition, Laurie Halberg, instructor in art, was granted a leave of absence for the 1965 spring quarter.

Taking sabbatical leaves will be Miss Freda Martin, instructor in English; Robert Hall, instructor in business administration, and Philip Tideman, assistant professor of geography. Those who will go on leave of absence are Claude DelZoppo, instructor in sociology; Ben Moore, instructor in physics, and Dr. Martha Worthington, chairman of the foreign languages department.

## NEW ADMISSIONS PLAN TO BEGIN NEXT FALL

A deferred admissions program will begin next fall, requiring incoming freshmen of low academic standing to delay their entrance for one quarter. Transfer students who attained less than a C average in the previous college attended also will be deferred for one quarter.

Approved by the State College Board, the plan is designed to reduce problems of heavy enrollment each fall.

### SUMMER SESSIONS INCLUDE WORKSHOPS, INSTITUTES, PLAYS, TRIP TO HAWAII

Nine workshops, two science institutes, ten theatre productions and a field trip to Hawaii are on the 1964 summer agenda at the college. In addition, more than 300 regular courses will be conducted during the two summer sessions, June 16-July 17 and July 21-Aug. 21.

Dr. Philip Youngner, physics department chairman, will direct a Cooperative College-School Science Program June 15-July 17, supported by a \$26,665 grant from the National Science Foundation. Other staff members will be Dr. Merle Michaelson, Dr. John Laakso, Dr. Alexander McWilliams and Louis Hird.

Dr. Harold Hopkins, biology department chairman, will direct an institute for junior and senior high school science teachers July 20-Aug. 21, supported by a \$50,280 NSF grant. Other staff members will be Dr. John Erickson, Dr. Alexander McWilliams and Dr. Max Partch.

The plays will be produced between June 15 and Aug. 29 at Theatre L'Homme Dieu, the college's summer theatre near Alexandria. Directors are Dr. Arthur Housman and R. Keith Michael. The trip to Hawaii from July 20 to Aug. 12 will be directed by Dr. Robert Brown, professor of geography.

### NEW BUILDING NAMED

The college's new health and physical education building has been named Philip L. Halenbeck Hall by action of the State College Board. Dr. Halenbeck has been a physician in St. Cloud for 37 years. He provided the college's first scholarships and has been a member of its foundation since it was established in 1959.

LIBRARY HOURS INCREASED -- Kiehle Library is now open until 5 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays, marking the third time hours have been extended in the past six years. Previously the library closed at 4 p.m. Fridays and 2 p.m. Saturdays.

### COLLEGE SEEKS FEDERAL GRANT TO HELP FINANCE TV STATION

The college has been authorized to seek a federal grant of \$150,000 to cover half the estimated cost of establishing an educational television station for central Minnesota. The grant cannot be made unless the Legislature provides matching funds.

Studio facilities would be located in the new fine arts building on which construction will begin later this year. A 600-foot transmitter would be erected near St. Cloud. The station would have a range of 60 to 70 miles.

### ACCOUNTING DEPARTMENT OPENS WITH FOUR FACULTY MEMBERS

A new department of accounting has been organized in the School of Business and Industry. The department will offer a program certified by the Minnesota Board of Accountancy. Students will be qualified to take a CPA examination upon graduation.

Members of the department are Dr. Edwin Nash, LeRoy Imdieke, William Bol-lom and Russell Madsen.

### INTERNSHIP PROGRAM PLANNED

The college will conduct an internship program for elementary teachers next year at Osseo and White Bear Lake, the first of its kind in Minnesota. Beginning teachers with a B.S. degree will teach for one year under the guidance of a master teacher.

## NEW ENROLLMENT RECORD

More full-time, on-campus students attended the college winter quarter than fall quarter, setting a new enrollment record. On-campus students carrying nine or more quarter hours of credit totaled 4,229, compared with 4,179 fall quarter students. Overall registration, including off-campus and television courses, was 4,913.

## TWO SUMMER SESSIONS SCHEDULED

The college will conduct two five-week summer sessions again this year, June 16-July 17 and July 21-Aug. 21. Enrollment reached a record high of 3,478 last summer.

## COMPUTER INSTALLED

Something new has been added to the campus -- a three-unit electronic computer (IBM 1620) to be used for instruction, administration and research. The college was allowed a 60 per cent discount from the \$100,000 retail price. Louis Hird, instructor in mathematics, has been named coordinator of computer services. Several faculty members have completed one-week training sessions to become familiar with the computer. The equipment is temporarily located across the hall from the Registrar's Office in Stewart Hall.

## TWENTY-THREE PROMOTED BY STATE COLLEGE BOARD

## FOUR BUILDINGS TAKE SHAPE; TWO MORE SCHEDULED SOON

This year's faculty will see six buildings in various stages of construction as the college prepares for an enrollment of 8,000 by 1970.

Halenbeck Hall, the largest structure, is rapidly taking shape at the south end of the campus. The \$2,235,000 split-level physical education building features a gymnasium seating 8,000.

To be started late this fall is the Atwood Memorial College Center, a \$1,350,000 building which will serve students, faculty, alumni and visitors. The center will be erected along First Avenue South across from Stewart Hall. Facilities will include meeting rooms, lounges, dining rooms, snack bar, bowling lanes and offices. A \$1,200,000 fine arts building will be started next spring.

Under construction is a nine-story residence hall, the college's first high-rise building. The 400-bed dormitory, costing \$1,195,111, will be completed by next September.

Workmen are erecting a \$314,430 addition to Garvey Commons, the food service building. Nearing completion is a \$121,352 maintenance and service building which adjoins the heating plant.

The college has requested more than \$6.5 million from the 1965 Legislature to continue the building program.

## NEW SCHOOL YEAR OPENS WITH FACULTY MEETINGS

The college's 96th academic year begins at 9 a.m. Monday, Sept. 21, with faculty meetings conducted by the deans of the three schools.

Meeting places are: Business and Industry, Room 215, Stewart Hall; Education, Gray Campus School Auditorium; Science, Literature and Arts, Headley Hall Auditorium. Departmental meetings are scheduled for 11 a.m. in rooms to be announced by department chairmen.

All faculty are invited to a noon luncheon at Garvey Commons. Tickets (\$1) will be sold at the 9 a.m. school meetings.

An orientation for new faculty will begin at 8:30 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 22, in Room 207, Stewart Hall. At 10:30 a.m. faculty advisers will meet in Brown Hall Auditorium. Advisers will meet their advisees in the afternoon, beginning at 1:30 p.m.

## ENROLLMENT HITS 5,482

Enrollment reached 5,482 students this fall, an increase of 386 over last year. Included in the record total are 5,101 on-campus students. The freshman class of 1,610 represents a 21 per cent increase over last fall's 1,275. The college deferred 335 prospective students until winter quarter because of low academic standing and low scores on aptitude tests.

The bookstore will be relocated in the former cafeteria area in the basement of Stewart Hall during the Christmas vacation. The new self-service facility will include a post office substation.

The college's nine-story residence hall now under construction will be named for W. W. Holes of St. Cloud, a former member of the State College Board. Holes was president of the board when the revenue bond program for financing new residence halls at the state colleges was inaugurated.
