FACULTY SHOULD "AIM HIGH" TO LEET DEMANDS, SAYS WICK

"Aim very high" in the decades ahead to meet the challenges of increasing enrollments, Acting President Robert H. Wick said at a faculty meeting Feb. 16 in Brown Hall Auditorium.

"The college's tradition, location, relative smallness and the support we receive from the state combine to offer us a most promising future," he maintained. "It would be a mistake to plan on the assumption of limited financial support because if we plan well enough the plans will produce their own support. If we mean to do important things, based on creative ideas, the money will be forthcoming."

Dr. Wick said the college's concern for the individual student must be continued while the campus develops as a unified intellectual, cultural and social community. He emphasized quality instruction that will give each graduate "a command of the basic knowledge underlying his field" and yet make him "versatile enough to adjust throughout his life to new conditions and new practice."

The college community should provide a "vibrant atmosphere" for both students and faculty, concerned about public issues, international affairs, the arts, books and philosophy, he added. The curriculum and environment "should continue to attract and sustain the able and serious students and discourage the less responsible and less cap

COLIEGE SEEKS NEARLY \$14 MILLION
TO CONTINUE EXPANSION PROGRAM

St. Cloud State College is seeking nearly \$14 million from the 1967 Legislature to provide facilities for an estimated enrollment of almost 9,000 full-time on-campus students by 1970.

In a report Jan. 28 to the Legislative Building Commission, Acting President Robert H. Wick asked for an education building, art building, companion structure to the physical education building, married student housing, supplemental appropriations for a fine arts building and new library and closed—circuit television. He also requested additional funds for repairs and improvements.

The ten-member commission will make recommendations to the 1967 Legislature. The 1965 Legislature appropriated about half the \$6.5 million requested by the college for buildings.

Dr. Wick told the commission that if present trends continue, St. Cloud's enrollment will reach 8,784 full-time on-campus students by 1970 and 11,870 by 1975. The college's growth potential "is closely related to its central location in the state and its close proximity to the Twin Cities," he explained. "This helps account for the fact that we are the second largest state college, drawing students from every county and with the highest in-state student enrollment precentage of all the state colleges."

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# FOUR FACULTY MEMBERS GRANTED SABBATICALS

Four faculty members have been granted sabbatical leaves for the 1966-67 academic year by the State College Board. They are Allen Brink, Harry Olson, Charles Crane and Louis Hird. In addition, Harold Opgrand was awarded a sabbatical leave for the 1966 fall quarter. All will work toward doctor's degrees.

Leaves of absence were granted to six other faculty members: Dr. Rowland Anderson, two years; Dr. Irvamae Applegate, one year; R. Keith Michael, one year; Mrs. Marion Michael, one year; Mrs. Ruth Morgan, spring quarter 1967, and Dr. Harold Hopkins, part of spring quarter 1966.

# WINTER QUARTER ENROLLMENT HITS ALL-TIME HIGH: 6,426

Still another enrollment record was established this winter quarter at the college when the number of cn-campus students reached 6,426.

The new figure represents an increase of 129 over fall quarter on-campus enrollment, which was 22 per cent higher than 1964. Among the currently enrolled students are 5,945 attending classes on a full-time basis compared with 5,713 last fall.

## COLLEGE OFFERS 24 OFF-CAMPUS COURSES

The college will offer 24 off-campus evening courses this spring in 13 communities. They are Alexandria, Anoka, Browerville, Brainerd, Cambridge, Columbia Heights, Litchfield, Mound, Osseo, Mounds View, North St. Paul, White Bear Lake and Willmar.

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# COLLEGE SEEKS \$14 MILLION FOR EXPANSION (Continued from Page 1)

The proposed \$2.1 million education building, housing most of the School of Education, would include lecture, conference and observation rooms, laboratories, materials center and offices. The \$2 million art building would allow the rapidly-expanding art department to vacate the second floor of Headley Hall, which is needed by the Institute of Industrial Education and Technology.

Dr. Wick requested \$2.1 million for a companion building to Halenbeck Hall and for adjacent fields and courts. Pointing out that 540 married students are enrolled, he asked for \$650,000 to build 50 units of married student housing. For closed-circuit TV the college is seeking \$350,000.

A \$500,000 supplemental appropriation is needed for a fine arts building authorized by the 1963 Legislature, although that request will be dropped if a similar bid for federal funds is successful, he indicated. Dr. Wick said \$2.8 million is needed for the second phase of a new library planned for 8,000 students. The 1965 Legislature appropriated \$800,000 for the building and the college has applied for \$400,000 in federal funds.

The college also is seeking \$1.6 million to acquire six blocks of property at the southwest corner of the campus for new dormitory-food service units and four blocks directly west of the campus for academic buildings and parking areas. Slightly over \$1 million was requested as the state's one-fourth share of proposed new dormitory and food service facilities. The remaining three-fourths would be financed through revenue bonds. A total of \$598,000 was requested for repairs and improvements, including a warehouse, improved campus lighting and more off-street parking areas.

Dr. Rowland Anderson has accepted a two-year assignment to the Institute of Education at Makerere University in Kampala, Uganda, Starting this June, he will be associated with the teacher education program for the East African nations of Uganda, Kenya and Tanzania supervised by Columbia University. Dr. Anderson will help develop a teacher education program in mathematics for Uganda schools. Dr. A. H. Schelske, former Gray Campus School principal, has been involved in the program since last summer... # SUMMER AGENDA INCLUDES WORKSHOPS, TRIPS, PLAYS

Eleven workshops, field trips to Nova Scotia and Europe, ten theatre productions, an art colony, a National Science Foundation institute and more than 450 regular courses are on the college's 1966 summer agenda. Summer enrollment hit a record high of 4,371 last year.

Special features during the first five-week session, June 16-July 19, include workshops in elementary mathematics, computer programing, power mechanics, elementary school social studies and school administration.

Scheduled during the second session, July 21-Aug. 23, are workshops in learning and teaching strategies, elementary school art, economic education for elementary teachers, nutrition education, emerging Africa and mental retardation.

Eastern Canada and northeastern United States will be toured in the Nova Scotia geography field trip July 22-Aug. 14. The European music field trip begins June 18 and ends Aug. 1.

Ten plays will be produced at Theatre L'Homme Dieu, the college's summer theatre next Alexandria. Twenty-six courses will be offered at a nearby art colony. Sixty junior and senior high school science teachers will participate in the NSF biology-chemistry-physics institute July 4-Aug. 12.

#### SHIRLEY CONCERT ENDS FESTIVAL

A concert March 2 by the Don Shirley Trio closed the college's annual Fine Arts Festival. Other features included a play by the College Theatre, four art lectures and four art exhibits, the Vienna Choir Boys, Herbert Blau and four concerts by college musical groups. able students from entering and staying." This does not mean, he cautioned, that formal admission standards should cater to an intellectual elite.

Dr. Wick said the college should become more internationally oriented. "In this age, knowledge transcends local and national boundaries. Social issues are global and world community is a live possibility. The horizons of students and faculty must be enlarged and the important issues of our age must be confronted."

He also maintained that a continual effort is needed to help students become self-reliant and self-motivated learners.

"I wish to emphasize my great pride in the caliber of our faculty and in your effectiveness as teachers and administrators," he added. "I know of your personal desire to be adequate to every call."

The college, he said, must become deeply involved in the affairs of the community, the state and the nation.

A member of the faculty for 18 years, Dr. Wick had been named acting president last Aug. 1, just one month after becoming academic dean. He also has been speech department chairman and dean of the School of Arts and Sciences. He has been president of both the Faculty Senate and the Faculty Association.

# FEDERAL GRANTS TOTAL \$914,928 IN 1965-66

St. Cloud State College received a total of \$914,928 in federal grants during the 1965-66 fiscal year, according to <u>Dr. Paul Ingwell</u>, director of research. The largest grant -- \$802,000 -- will help finance a fine arts building. The federal funds will supplement \$1,740,000 already appropriated by the state legislature.

Other amounts received were: \$17,183 for a chemistry laboratory; \$60,480 for a summer science institute; \$6,265 for an in-service program for science teachers, \$5,000 for library materials and \$24,000 to help prepare teachers for the mentally retarded.

# THOUSANDS PARTICIPATE IN INAUGURAL EVENTS

Thousands of students, faculty, alumni and friends participated in Inaugural Weekend activities for President Robert H. Wick Oct. 27-29 at the college. Renewing a spirit of pride and respect for the 97-year-old institution, the festival featured six major events.

The first attraction was a concert by the Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Stanislaw Skrowaczewski Cct. 27 in Halenbeck Hall. Kenneth Keating, former U.S. senator who is now a member of the New York State Court of Appeals, spoke at an Oct. 28 convocation in Stewart Hall Auditorium. Dr. Wick and his party were honored at a buffet that evening in Garvey Commons for active and retired faculty and their spouses.

A tradition was established at the inaugural ceremony Oct. 29 in Halenbeck Hall. Gov.
