A student who finds it necessary to leave school before the close of the quarter should make arrangements with the Dean of Women or Dean of Men for an honorable dismissal. If it is impossible to do this before leaving, the students should write to the dean as soon as possible explaining fully reasons for leaving.

A student program is a sixteen-hour program, exclusive of physical education or a one-hour course unless additional courses have been approved by the administration. No credit can be allowed for work which does not appear on the program and which must be on file in the office of the Registrar.

Graduates of high school teacher training departments who have not had their records transferred to the college must submit their credits with a statement of their teaching experience to the Registrar as soon as possible.

Subjects may be dropped only with the approval of the administration. Students who drop a course without permission will be dropped automatically from a second course and will receive a grade of "E" in each course. Students may drop a course during the first six weeks regardless of grade, but if he drops a course the last six weeks he will receive a grade of "E" if his work is failing at the time.
