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## PROCEDURE FOR PROCESSIONAL MONDAY EVENING

It is recommended that the faculty march two by two in order of the seniority in service at this institution. Please assemble west of the north goal posts for the line of march at 6:45 p.m.

Please leave a space of about a yard between couples.

Fall in behind the seniors who will march down the field, divide, and let the faculty pass through.

March to within a few feet of the south goal posts and remain facing the flag until after the flag raising, the invocation, the hymn, and the narrator's speech.

Then the band begins to play a march, the faculty will move between the goal posts about five feet, turn right, march to the edge of the green, turn right again, march down the green to the third group of steps, and ascend the steps to the proctors who will divide the faculty and indicate the seats in which they will sit. All will remain standing until the seniors have also taken their places.

At the close of the pageant, after the flag lowering, when the band starts playing, the final recessional will begin. The faculty will follow the seniors, march down the center of the field and then march off.
