COLLEGE CENTER FUND HITS \$202,000

Contributions and pledges to the Atwood Memorial College Center campaign now exceed \$202,000, according to Dr. Jack White, chairman of the fund raising committee. The goal is \$500,000, about one-third the cost of the building. A special student fee will provide the remainder. Construction is scheduled to begin next year if the Legislature appropriates money to purchase the site and allows the college to sell revenue bonds.

SUMMER DATES CHANGED

Dates for the college's 1963 summer sessions have been changed. Registration for the first session will be June 12 and classes will begin June 13. The session will close July 17. Second session registration will be July 22 and classes will begin July 23. The session ends Aug. 23.

COLLEGE RECEIVES GRANTS FOR TWO SUMMER INSTITUTES

The college has received National Science Foundation grants totaling \$77,460 to finance two 1963 summer institutes.

A \$26,760 grant will be used to conduct a cooperative college-school science and mathematics program for five weeks beginning June 10. Fifty-six high school juniors and nine high school science teachers will be accepted, according to Dr. Philip Youngner, director.

A \$50,700 grant will finance a five-week institute for junior and senior high school science teachers beginning July 22. Purpose of the program is to bring teachers up to date on developments in chemistry, biology and earth science. Dr. Harold Hopkins is the director.

IRAQI OFFICIAL VISITS CAMPUS

Rashid Salman Salbi, specialist inspector of education for the Ministry of Education in Iraq, visited the college March 11-15. Salbi has been in the U.S. since last fall gathering information to help organize teacher education programs in Iraq. SIX TO RECEIVE FUNDS
FOR 1963 SUMMER STUDY

Six faculty members will receive Danforth Foundation funds for 1963 summer study, according to President George F. Budd.

Dr. John Laakso, professor of biology and chemistry, will compare Finland with other Scandinavian countries through on-the-spot observations. Maynard Bjorgo, periodicals librarian, will continue his studies of two modern Irish writers, W. B. Yeats and James Joyce, at Yeats International Summer School at Sligo and Trinity College in Dublin.

Dr. Ralph Holloway, associate professor of sociology, will study content and methods used in general education programs in California colleges and universities which attempt to integrate the humanities, arts and sciences.

Dr. George Ferguson, associate professor of English, will spend two weeks at the Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington, D.C., studying 17th century graphic arts materials and manuscripts.

Robert Hall, instructor in business education, will study areas outside his own specialization at the University of Iowa and Cyril Morgan, instructor in business administration, will study economics at the University of Minnesota.

Selections were made by a committee composed of the president, academic dean, three school deans and faculty senate chairman. St. Cloud is among 20 colleges included in the program, which is sponsored by the Danforth Foundation of St. Louis, Mo. It is designed to strengthen the academic excellence of colleges primarily concerned with teacher education by enriching the educational and cultural backgrounds of their faculties. St. Cloud's participation ends this year.

**BALGAARD EXPLAINS BENEFITS
OF CREDIT UNION MEMBERSHIP**

Some 18,000 state employes in Minnesota are members of the State Capitol Credit Union, one of the third largest of its kind in the nation, according to Milton Balgaard, St. Cloud representative.

Both share accounts paying 3 3/4% interest and deposit for savings accounts paying 4 1/2% interest are available to faculty and staff at the college who wish to join. The share account provides up to \$2,000 free life insurance. Loans also are available at low interest rates. Payments to Credit Union accounts are permitted as a payroll deduction.

On this campus, 97 persons have share accounts totaling \$26,198, 40 have deposit accounts totaling \$60,641 and 45 have loans totaling \$47,692.

GRANT WILL AID PHYSICS PROGRAM

LEGISLATURE'S ACTION PAVES WAY FOR PHYSICAL EDUCATION BUILDING

A gymnasium seating 5,000 and an Olympic-sized swimming pool are included in a \$2,235,000 physical education building for the college which is part of the first appropriations bill to pass both houses of the 1963 Legislature.

The bill also provides the college with a \$141,000 maintenance and service building. Construction on both will begin later this year.

First passed by the 1961 Legislature, the building bill had to be repassed to satisfy legal requirements of bonding firms.

The physical education plant will be a multi-story, split level structure covering a city block southwest of Gray Laboratory School. The south end will house a swimming pool, diving pool and bleachers for 500, training room, first aid room, lockers, team rooms, offices, staff conference room, lounge, general office, seminar room and four classrooms.

Included in the main portion of the building will be two handball courts, storage rooms, two classrooms, gymnastics room, wrestling room, dance studio, main gymnasium with pull-out bleachers and two small gyms.

The maintenance and service building will be attached to the heating plant. It will include a warehouse, carpentry shop, office, paint room, metal shop, vehicle maintenance shop and vehicle storage carport.

A great many changes and events are taking place at St. Cloud State College these days which should be of interest to the parents of our students. I often suspect, however, that not enough of this information is reaching you. In an effort to improve our communication with parents, we are experimenting with this newsletter which will be mailed each quarter with grades. I hope both the newsletter and the grades will be good news at your house.

Communication, of course, is a two-way street. Not only do we want to keep you informed of college activities; we also want to hear from you. If you have questions, problems, or complaints, please do not hesitate to contact the appropriate office at the college. We will do our best to assist you.

This year the college is operating very effectively under a new organization plan adopted last spring. The former eight divisions have been replaced by three schools, each with a dean responsible to the dean of academic administration. The schools are Education, Business and Industry, and Science, Literature and Arts. The change was made to provide more flexibility as the college's enrollment and curriculum expand rapidly in the next few years.

Enrollment this year exceeded 4,800, including 3,986 full-time resident students. We are preparing for as many as 8,000 students by 1970. Our number of faculty positions has increased to 222. Despite this rapid growth, we still place a great deal of emphasis on individual attention. For example, each student is assigned to an adviser and each instructor maintains office hours when he is available for consultation.

We hope you will visit our campus this spring to see our new buildings and facilities. Although we are planning several special events for you on Parents' Day Sunday, May 5, be assured that you are welcome any time you can come. You'll be hearing more about Parents' Day later.

NEW BUILDINGS SCHEDULED

Construction will begin this summer on a new physical education building and a maintenance and service building from funds provided by the 1961 state building bill, repassed by the 1963 Legislature. The physical education plant will be a multi-story, split-level structure covering a city block. Facilities will include a swimming pool, diving pool, handball courts, gymnastics room, wrestling room, dance studio, classrooms, offices, main gymnasium seating 5,000 and two small gyms. Eastman Hall, the present physical education building, was constructed in 1929 for an enrollment of 900. The maintenance and service building will contain shops, a warehouse and vehicle storage carport. It will replace a temporary wooden structure.

FIRST MEDICAL TECHNOLOGY DEGREE

The college has awarded its first bachelor of science degree in medical technology to Roberta Frank, Waite Park. Thirty-six others are enrolled in the new program, in which the student spends three years at the college and the fourth in training at an approved hospital.

TWO STATIONS CARRY TV COURSE

The college will conduct a television course in "Conservation Education" this spring on two stations, one commercial and the other educational, located 150 miles apart. Dr. Harold Hopkins, biology department chairman, will teach the course from 8 to 9 a.m. Saturdays over KCMT, Channel 7, Alexandria, and from 7 to 8 p.m. Mondays over KTCA, Channel 2, St. Paul. The stations serve different audiences.

MORE FACILITIES COMPLETED

Students will begin using facilities in two new buildings during the spring quarter. Headley Hall, housing the departments of art and industrial arts, is a two-story structure providing classrooms, shops, offices, research laboratory, conference rooms, lecture hall, art studio, gallery and workrooms. The new building will relieve congestion in Stewart Hall. A food service building, not yet named, provides meals for commuting students and on-campus women students. Featuring the latest in food preparation equipment, the building is being financed by self-liquidating revenue bonds. It replaces Stewart Hall Cafeteria, which is unsuited to accommodate present and future enrollments.

COLLEGE AWARDED PHYSICS GRANT

The college has received a \$5,000 grant from the National Science Foundation to purchase equipment for its physics laboratories. This is the first federal aid the college has been awarded for scientific equipment. The grant will be matched by state funds to acquire four items within a year. They are a small mass spectrometer, an electron spin resonance spectrometer, a nuclear magnetic resonance spectrometer, and an omegatron apparatus.

SPAN STUDENTS NAMED

Three junior students will go abroad this summer under the sponsorship of Minnesota's Student Project for Amity among Nations. The students and countries they will visit are: Lebanon--Elizabeth Bruzek,

New Prague; Tanganyika--Charles Emery, Jr., St. Cloud, and Brazil--James Daly, Fridley. They are among 53 students from ten Minnesota colleges and universities chosen to participate in the 1963 program. SPAN students are selected on the basis of scholarship, leadership, language ability and interest in international affairs.

COLLEGE CENTER CAMPAIGN

More than \$201,000 has been contributed by faculty, alumni and friends to help finance an Atwood Memorial College Center on the campus. The campaign goal is \$500,000, about one-third the cost of the building, which will provide educational, social and recreational facilities for the community as well as the college. Income from a special \$5-per-quarter student fee, already nearing \$100,000, will be combined with voluntary contributions to initiate construction in the spring of 1964. First the Legislature must appropriate funds to purchase the site and pass legislation allowing the college to sell revenue bonds. The fund-raising campaign is the first of its kind for a Minnesota state college.

MAIL PRE-REGISTRATION SYSTEM

A mail pre-registration system will be adopted next fall to simplify class scheduling. Students may start using the system during the fall quarter as they pre-register for the winter quarter. By using the plan, students can avoid appointments and delays in checkout. The system will not be used by students who are new to the campus.

FOUR BUILDINGS NAMED

Three college buildings have been named for former presidents. They are: science and mathematics building, J. C. Brown Hall; campus laboratory school, Thomas J. Gray School, and industry and art building, John W. Headley Hall. The first dormitory in a new women's residence hall complex was named Helen Hill Hall. Miss Hill was a member of the faculty for 37 years.

FINE ARTS FESTIVAL

A performance March 7 by Anna Russell, internationally famous concert comedienne, concluded the college's third annual Fine Arts Festival. Other festival events included ragtime pianist Max Morath, American Folk Trio, Concert Band, Concert Choir, Erick Hawkins dance company, Archibald MacLeish's Pulitzer prize-winning play "J.B." and an art exhibit. Purpose of the festival is to engender greater appreciation and support for the fine arts at the college and throughout central Minnesota.

STUDENT TEACHING COUNCIL

A Student Teaching Council has been organized to keep the college's student teaching program working effectively. The council is composed of representatives from each of the 36 schools which cooperate in the program, three classroom teachers and five college representatives. All students must spend a full quarter student teaching at a cooperating school before receiving a bachelor of science degree. Some 600 are expected to participate in the program during 1963-64.

SUMMER PROGRAM

The college will offer eight workshops, two field trips and two institutes during the 1963 summer sessions. The workshops will include shorthand and typing innovations, programmed learning, electronics and practical radio, aero-space, summer theatre, school administration, elementary art and ceramics. Field trips will be conducted in Alaska and Europe. The institutes, both financed by the National Science Foundation, are for high school science students and teachers. The first session will be June 12-July 17 and the second July 22-August 23.

FIVE NEW BUILDINGS SCHEDULED IN 1963-65

Five buildings will be constructed on the campus during 1963-65 as a result of two building bills passed by the 1963 Legislature. They are: A fine arts building, a 200-bed addition to Hill Hall, a physical education building, a college center and a maintenance and service building.

The \$1,200,000 fine arts building will be located in the block bordered by Sixth and Seventh streets and Second and Third avenues. The Hill Hall wing will adjoin the present building on the north.

Property acquisition will begin soon for the physical education building, to be located across Tenth street southwest of Gray Campus Laboratory School. Atwood Memorial College Center, financed by contributions and a special student fee, will be built on First avenue across from Stewart Hall. The maintenance and service building will be attached to the heating plant.

The new food service building on First avenue across from Mitchell Hall will open at the beginning of the first summer session. Headley Hall, the new industry and art building, is already in use.

FACULTY SENATORS ELECTED -- Six "at large" representatives have been elected to the Faculty Senate. Chosen for three-year terms were Dr. James Davis, Dr. Fred Markwardt, Dr. Lars Peterson, Alyn Dull and Alfred Lease. Dr. Calvin Gower was elected for a one-year term. This year will see the largest number of students and faculty on our campus in the 94-year history of the college. We have 246 full-time faculty positions and expect around 4,500 students. Our new buildings will be dedicated at Homecoming on Oct. 12. Also, for the first time, distinguished alumni service awards will be presented. Faculty as well as students and alumni are urged to participate in this year's

Faculty Positions Reach New High of 246

FIFTY-FOUR NEW FULL-TIME FACULTY MEMBERS FILL VACANCIES, NEW POSITIONS;
NINETEEN RECEIVE PART-TIME APPOINTMENTS; THREE RETURN FROM YEAR'S LEAVE

Fifty-four new full-time faculty members will fill vacancies and new positions during the 1963-64 school year. Although the majority have never been at St. Cloud before, some are returning to the campus after a brief absence while others have moved from part-time to full-time status. In addition, three faculty members have returned from leave. Nineteen persons have received part-time faculty appointments. The total number of full-time faculty positions is 246, an increase of 24 over last year.

Dr. Howard Russell, a former deputy director of the International Educational Exchange Service, is associate professor of English. He recently retired from federal service after serving as educational exchange attache at the American Embassy in Bonn. He also was chairman of the Fulbright Commission in West Germany. He holds a Ph.D. from the University of North Dakota, where he was on the faculty 14 years, including five years as English department chairman.

Dr. David Ernest, assistant professor of music, has been chairman of the division of fine and applied arts, Glenville, W. Va., State College. He holds an Ed.D. from the University of Colorado. He also has studied at Sorbonne, University of Paris, as a Fulbright scholar. He has taught in Illinois public schools and at the University of Colorado. For three years he was musical director of the Fifth Army band. He wrote an opera for the 1963 West Virginia Centennial.

Dr. Donald Silkink, associate professor of speech and dramatic arts, has been director of forensics and chairman of the speech department at South Dakota State College. He holds a Ph.D. from the University of Minnesota. He has headed South Dakota State College's Faculty Association and has received the Central States Speech Association's "outstanding teacher" award.

St. Cloud's new food service building has been named Beth Porter Garvey Commons in tribute to the college's first dean of women. Now a resident of Redlands, Calif., Mrs. Garvey served on the faculty for 28 years, from 1925 until her retirement in 1953.

Two private dining rooms have been named for prominent alumni families. The Hayden Room is named for four Hayden sisters who attended the college between 1904 and 1922 and the Joyner Room is named for three Joyner brothers who were graduated between the years 1914 and 1922.

Mrs. Garvey and members of the Hayden and Joyner families plan to return to the campus for Homecoming Oct. 12 when the building and two others -- Headley Hall and Hill Hall -- will be dedicated.

MORE THAN \$235,000 RAISED FOR COLLEGE CENTER PROJECT

The Atwood Memorial College Center development fund totaled more than \$235,000 on Sept. 1. Contributions and pledges from alumni, faculty and businessmen will be accepted through Homecoming, according to Dr. Jack White, chairman of the fund-raising drive.
